SIGMA OMICRON LAMBDA

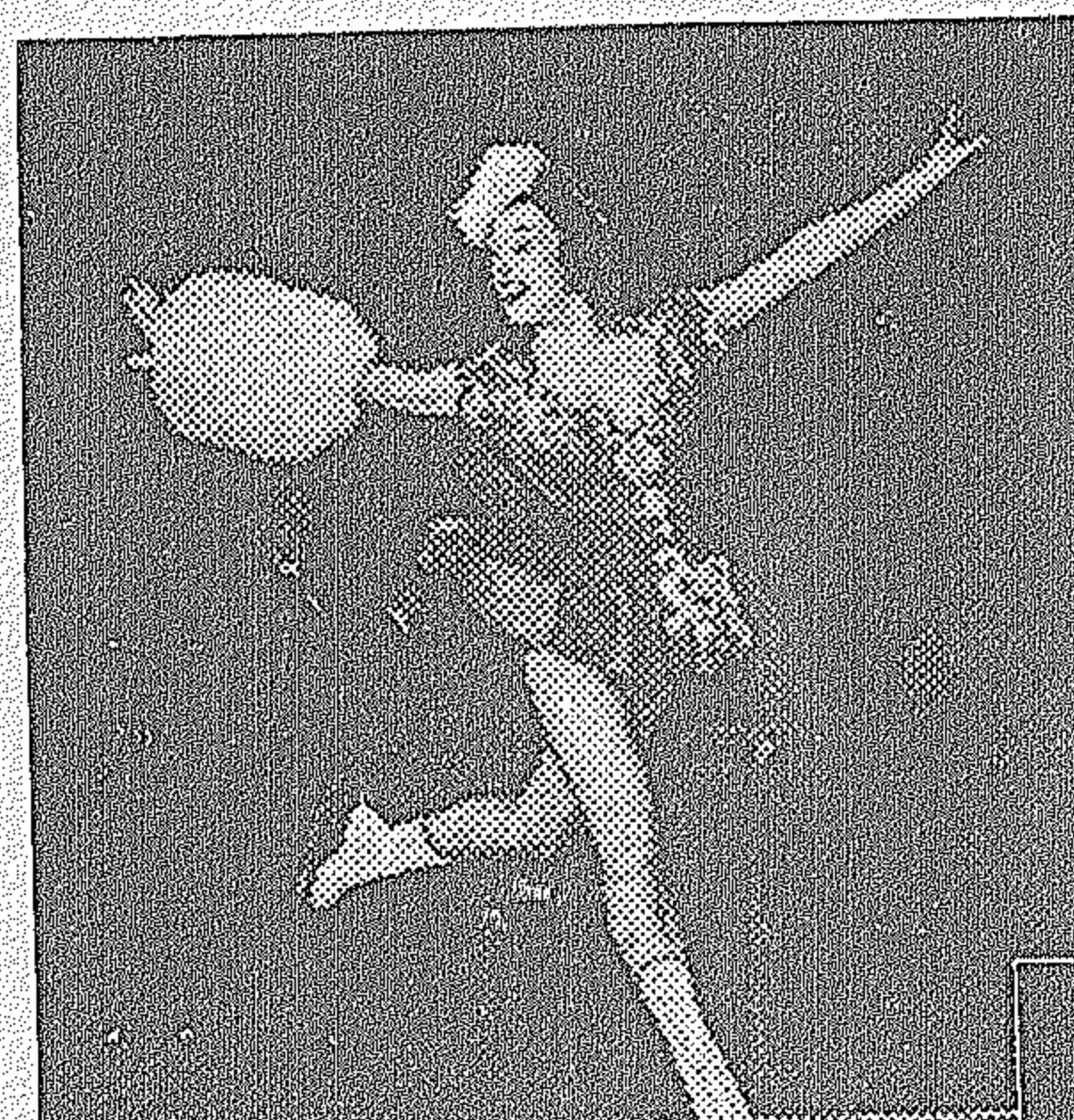
Sigma Omicron Lambda sorority will have its monthly meeting on Sunday, March 27, at the home of Sylvia Wcislo.

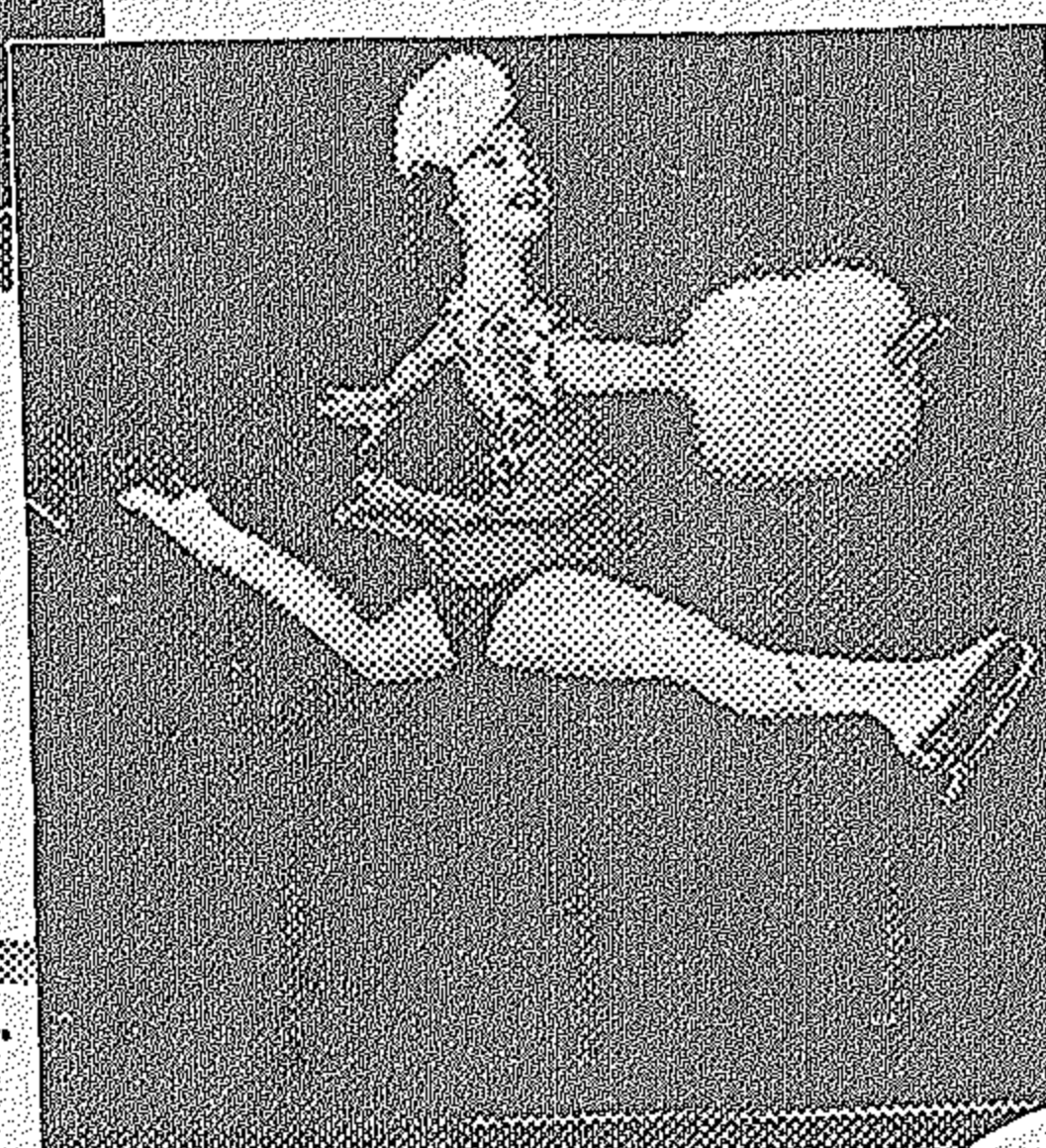

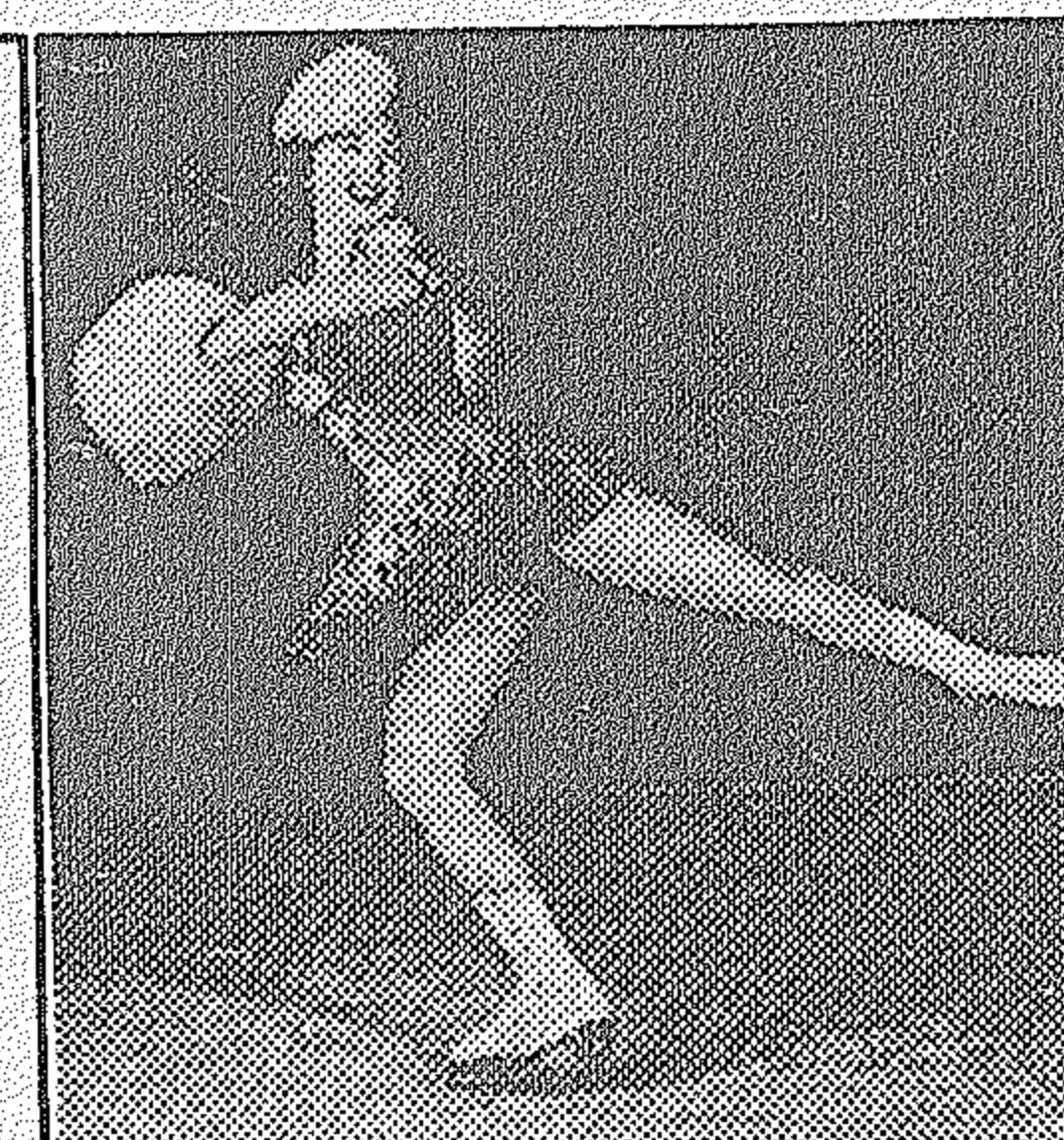

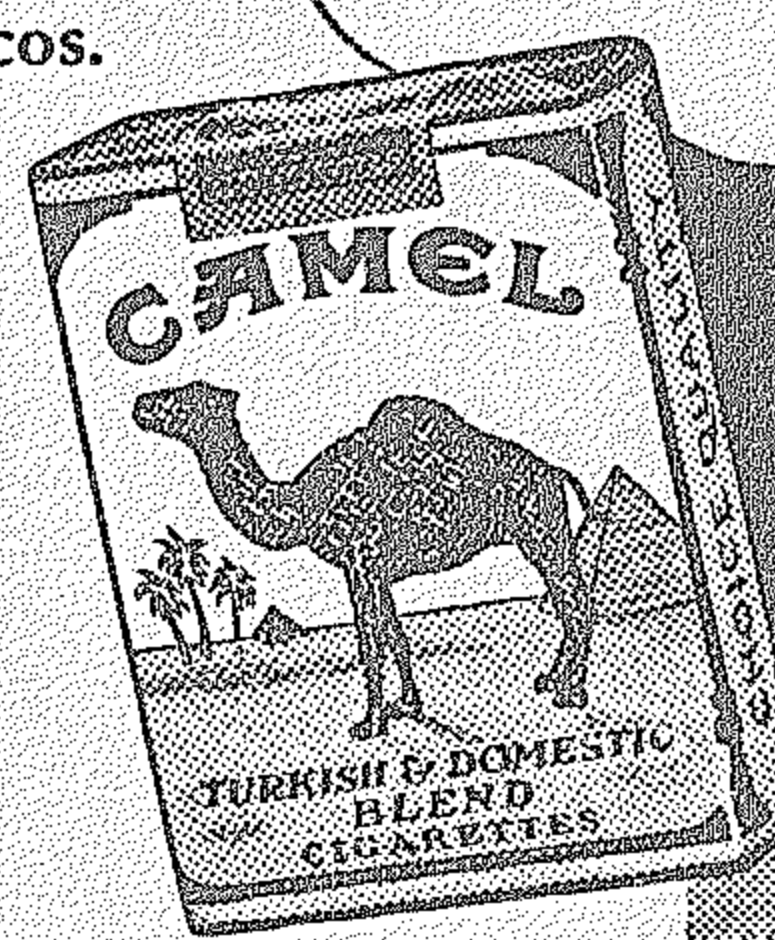
