Signal corps graduates 450 radio and electrical communications experts

Four hundred and thirty men, who will call signals for the strongest team in the world, the United States Army, completed their training course at Illinois Tech on Thursday, October 15.

The men are officers and enlisted reserved in the Army Signal Corps who have been trained as ultra-high frequency radio engineers, electronics experts, and radio technicians and mechanics.

The graduation was held October 15, in the auditorium of the Museum of Science and Industry.

A general assembly of all Armour students will be held on Tuesday at 1:00 p.m., in the auditorium, to explain the present draft situation.

President Heald and Professor Schommer will speak. Mr. Heald has just returned from Washington where he has received the latest facts on manpower allocation. It is hoped that this assembly will relieve some of the indecision displayed by most students in regard to the proper course to take in this crisis, and to determine the part the university will play in the war effort.

The radio training program, under the direction of Dr. Hobson, has enrolled more than 1,000 evening students, undoubtedly the largest in this field in the country. The inspection program under Professor Kozacka has enrolled approximately 600 individuals.

In order to provide adequate laboratory time for these two courses, the Lewis building will be operated on Sunday. Machine Shop work will be given in the Fundamentals of Engineering course on Sunday as well.

Newly-named Ring acts to clarify architecture

Vagtborg announces four appointments

Four appointments were announced recently to the staff of the Armour Research Foundation by Director Harold Vagtborg.

The four men are Martin Kalena, Iowa City, Iowa; R. S. Olsen, Chicago; Leonard F. Griffith, Mt. Pleasant, Iowa; and Louis A. Lembach, Lexington, Nebraska. They will serve on the metallurgy, ceramics, physics, and photography staffs, respectively, of the Foundation.

Kalena is a former instructor at the State University of Iowa. He received Bachelor of Science and Master of Science degrees from the University of Saskatchewan, majoring in physical chemistry.

Olsen, a graduate of the University of Indiana, has served as ceramist with the International Smelting and Refining company of East Chicago, Indiana. He lives at 7526 Eberhart Avenue.

Griffith, appointed to the physics staff, was formerly chief engineer of the Indicating Instrument Division of the Burlington Instrument corporation in Mt. Pleasant. He attended Iowa Wesleyan college.

Lembach, now of 5481 South Blackstone, was formerly office manager of the Royal Sound Equipment company. He will be assistant photographer with the physics staff at the Foundation. He attended the University of Nebraska.

IIT's professional architecture fraternity, the Ring, acted last week to promulgate an exhibit which will bring the fraternity closer to its goal, the clarification of architecture.

John D. Randall, chairman of the exhibit, stated that the material will be trifoliate in format, showing the work of IIT's department of architecture, of outstanding Chicago practitioners, and of members of the so-called "international school" of modern architecture.

Presented under the aegis of the Wilmette Women's club, the exhibition will be open to the public from 7:30 to 10:00 p.m. on November 18 and 20. Ring members will be on hand to provide and to guide visitors through the freltic quarters of the Women's club building, site of the exhibit.

Conceived as a travelling display, the architecture exhibit may, if well received in Wilmette, be presented elsewhere. Wesley Pipher, president of the Ring, shrugged his shoulders when interrogated and said philosophically, "Who knows? Anything can happen."

The Wilmette exhibit is only one phase of the activities of the Ring. The organization has been pinguidly occupied since it severed itself from Scarab fraternity. Nameless for many months, the new professional fraternity nevertheless has been active not only in the formulation of new principles but in actual work in architecture.

Rules and Regulations for Student Union Building

I.-Management

1. The management of this building, excepting the dining hall and book store, is in the hands of the student union and the appointed manager. (The manager shall be in direct charge. Any controversies arising shall be settled by the board.)
2. The management of the dining room and the book store, as well as all financial matters pertaining to the Student Union building, is in the hands of the treasurer of the Institute. The student board and the manager shall assume responsibility for student conduct in the lunchroom and the bookstore.
3. The board shall meet the first and third Wednesday of every month and any other time as may be considered necessary by the chairman of the board. Adjournment over a definite period of time shall be voted upon by the board.
4. Students having complaints or suggestions to the board should file same with the chairman of the board or the manager of the Student Union at least two days before the board meets.
5. Requests for rooms (meeting or dining) or the entire building must be in the hands of the manager at least one week in advance of the day desired. A policy of first come, first served shall apply until circumstances warrant a change.

II.-Hours

1. The Student Union building will be open for student use on: Weekdays (except Wednesday and Saturday)—8:00 a.m.-10:00 p.m. Wednesday—8:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m. Saturday—8:00 a.m.-12:00 noon.
- These hours do not apply to either the dining hall or the book store, and they are subject to change without notice by either the manager or the board.
2. The Student Union building shall be open for use at any other time as may be deemed necessary by the manager or the board.

III.-The Dining Hall

1. The dining hall shall be the only room to be used by the students for eating purposes.
2. Card playing, chess, checkers or studying is PROHIBITED at all times.

IV.-Study Hall and Auditorium

1. Smoking or card playing will not be permitted.
2. The chairs and tables are not to be moved.
3. That a degree of silence conducive to study be maintained.

V.-Lounge

1. Studying in the lounge will NOT be permitted. Studying here applies to written work. Reading will be allowed.
2. The lamps are not to be moved.
3. The larger chairs should not be moved. Any small chair moved should be returned to its proper place.
4. Card playing should be confined to the tables as provided. Gambling will NOT be tolerated.

VI.-General

1. In all cases, gentlemanly conduct is expected of all students. Suspension from the use of the facilities of the building for a definite period of time shall serve as the penalty for any infraction of the rules, or the understood rules of good conduct.
2. Any room in the Student Union may be closed at the discretion of the manager or the board.
- Students found guilty of damaging or destroying property of the Union building will be charged for the necessary repairs.
4. All intramural equipment will be kept in the check room.
