Physical fitness program proceeds

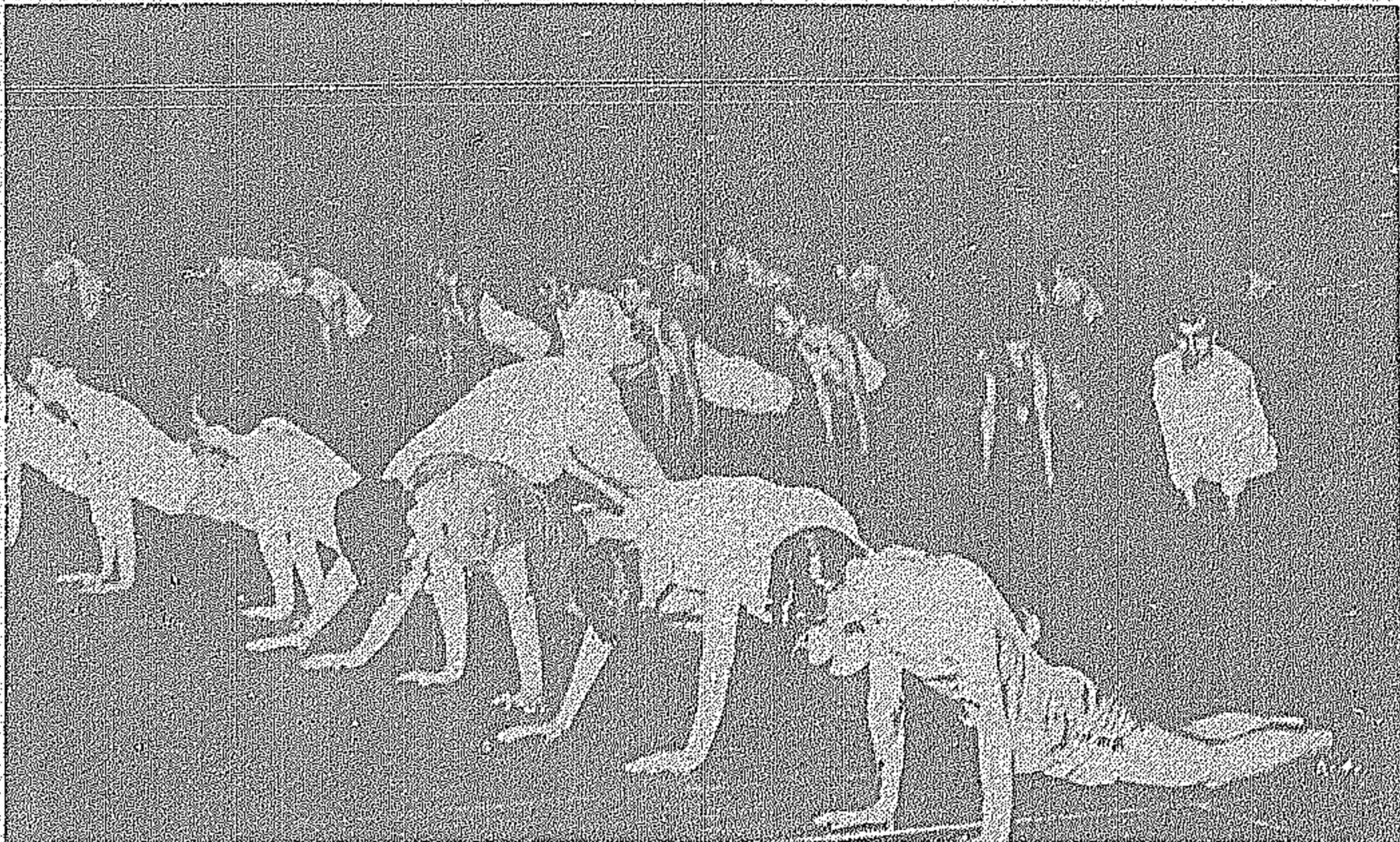
The other day we stopped in at the office of the physical fitness director, Grant Stenger. He was preparing to meet a group of reversists so we waited and watched the conditioning program in action.
