Illinois Tech coaches active in big time refereeing circles

Illinois Tech's athletic department has an abundance of refereeing experience as well as coaching ability. They run the gauntlet of the Big Ten, National Professional Football League, Golden Gloves, professional boxing, college basketball, and high school football.

John Schommer was dean for many years of the Big Ten football referees. In 1940, the same year that Elmer Layden was appointed czar of the National Professional league Schommer transferred his talents to the "pro" league. He now officiates at practically all Chicago Bears and Green Bay home games. Not being content with being a leading referee and athletic director at Illinois Tech, he has outlined an article in his capacity as an authority on refereeing. This treatise was one of the leading articles in the last issue of Esquire magazine.

"Sonny" Weissman is a coach with wide experience in the ring. Every year he serves as a referee in the intense Golden Gloves tournament. During the rest of the year he refs many of the professional bouts about Chicago. He does this ref-

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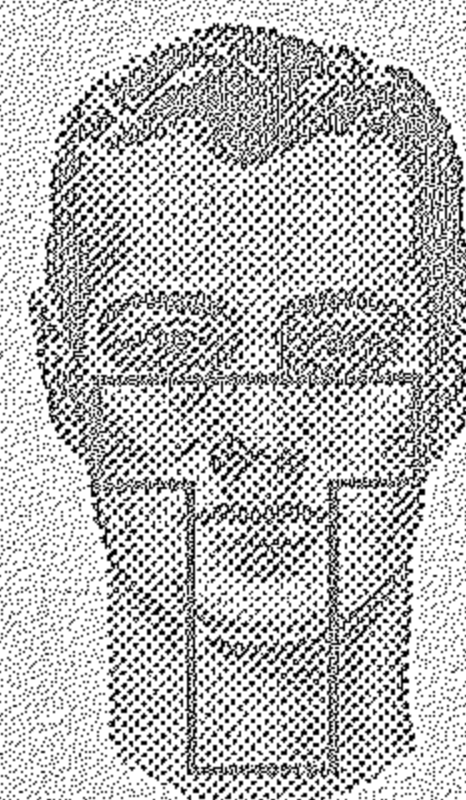
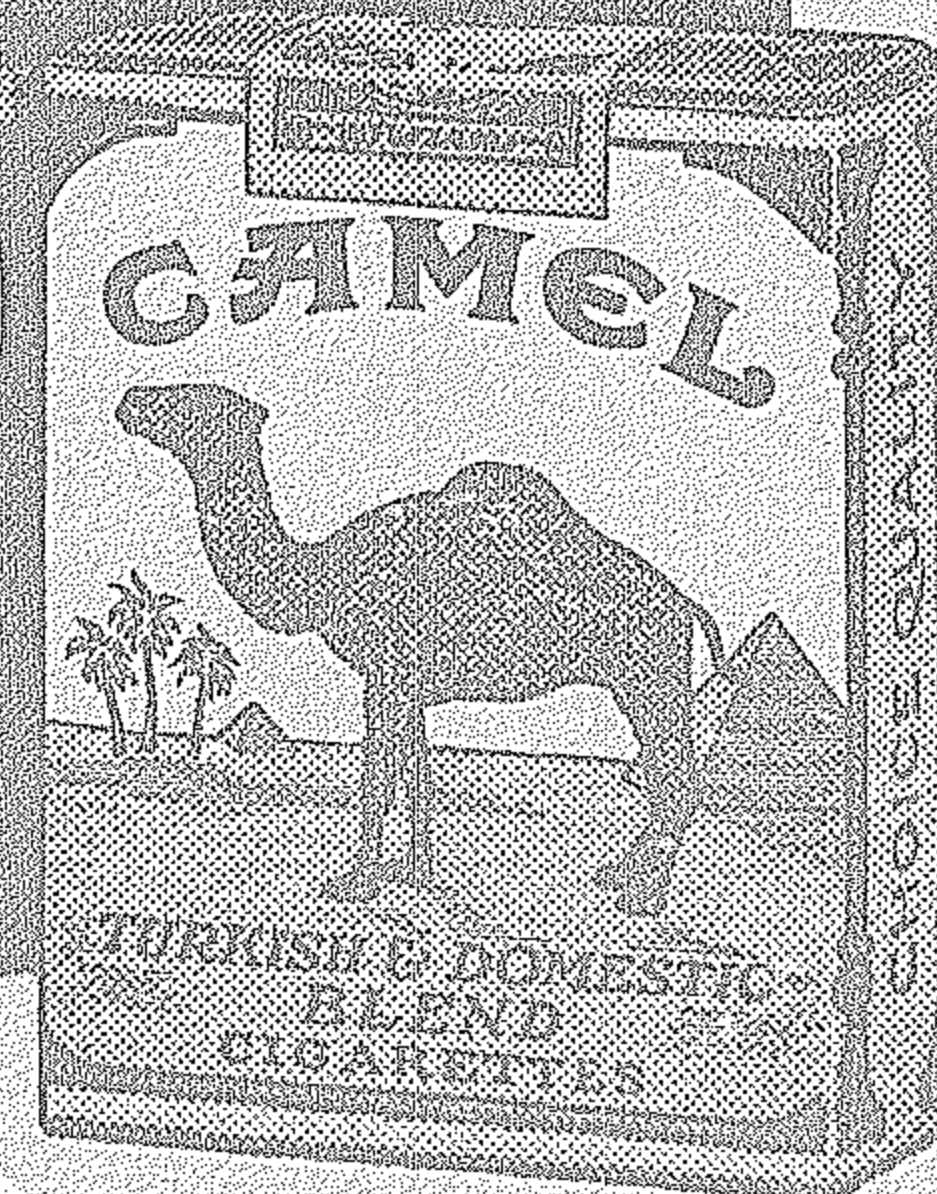
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
