Chems trounce Civils; Freshmen down Mechs

Rapidly approaching a climax, the intramural bowling tourney last week saw the elimination of the Junior Civils and an initial defeat for the Soph Mechs. Thus three teams, the Jr. Chems, the Freshmen, and the Soph Mechs are deadlocked in the tourney each with one defeat.

Intramural softball regulations announced by IM manager

All games must be played the week they are scheduled. Only exception to this rule is a game which is rained out and cannot be played any other time during the week. Failure to play off as scheduled will result in a forfeit for one or both teams. In case of conflicts, see captain of opposing team and arrange date. If no date can be arranged, notify the intramural manager. All games must start ten minutes after the hour.

Scores must be turned in the day the game is played, dated and signed by the umpire.

If no umpire is scheduled for your game, you may choose an umpire agreeable to both captains. If a team believes they are the victim of a bad interpretation of the rules, they should inform the umpire that they are playing the game under protest and continue the game. Decisions cannot be protested. A team which delays the game by arguing will forfeit at the discretion of the umpire. All protests will be referred to the A. A. U. Softball rule book.

Pitching

A sixteen inch ball will be provided for all games. This is a slow pitching tournament.

Both feet must be on the rubber when the pitching motion is begun. The palm of the hand must be open and facing up when the ball leaves the hand. The elbow should not be further than six inches from the hip. Hesitation and side arm pitches are balls.

Ground Rules

When a ball hits the wire or telephone poles on the fly in the Dearborn Street field it is an automatic double. Base runners advance two bases. If ball hits the poles on the bounce standard rules apply.

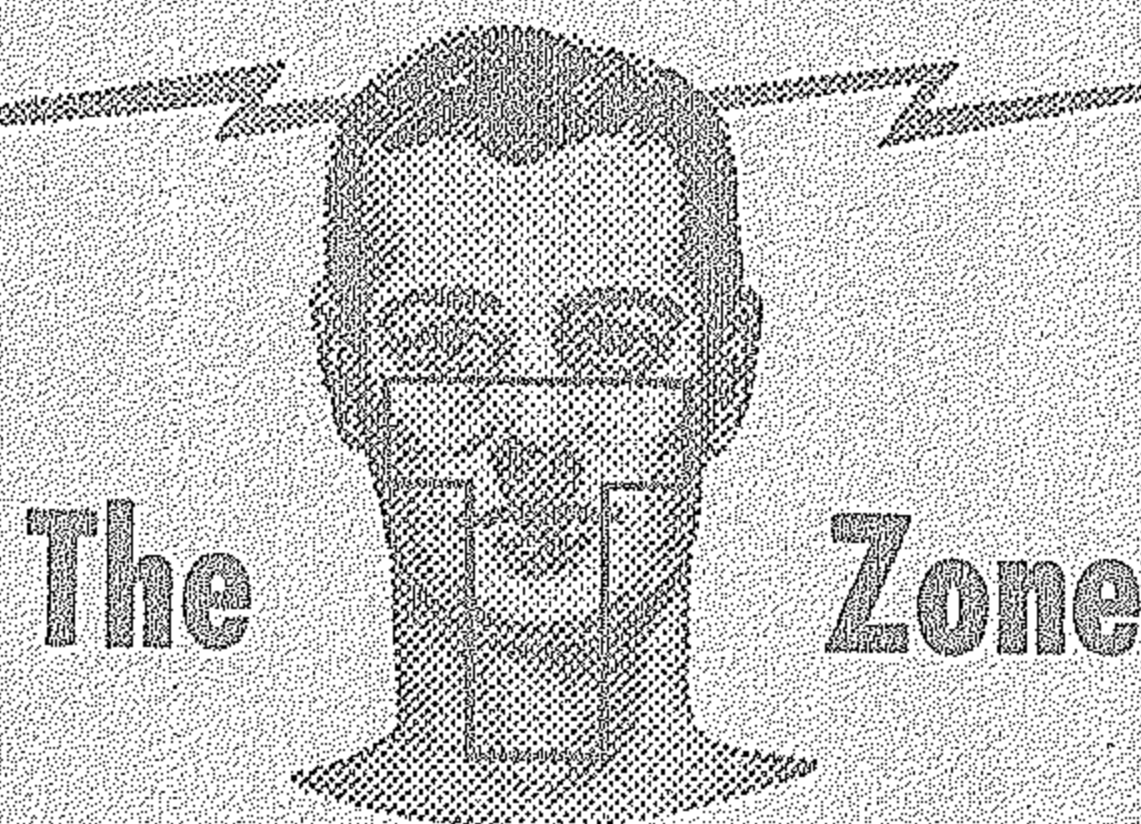
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
