

SIX ITSA Benefits Open to Navy

Lt. Hamilton Endorses Participation by Navy

The ITSA will offer memberships to navy students next semester. This was announced by Harry Anderson, ITSA president, who stated that memberships may be obtained while registering for the coming semester.

The membership fee, which will be five dollars, will include one dollar for *Technology News*, \$1.75 for the Integral, and 75 cents for the Engineer and Alumnus. The Integral fee will be applied to that one given last semester to cover the total cost to the student. Students cannot obtain an Integral unless a total of three dollars has been paid.

Lt. W. A. Hamilton, commander of the V-12 unit, said "he felt that every navy student should participate in extra-curricular activities through the ITSA activity fee."

Harry Anderson stated that the program for the coming semester will include six intramural tournaments. Tournaments will be held in touchball, basketball, swimming, boxing, wrestling and bowling. Medals will be awarded the winners.

The ITSA will also sponsor the glee club, the orchestra, various school dances and varsity sports. The Integral, IIT's yearbook will also be published during the coming semester.

During the past semester the ITSA secured an FM set for the lunchroom, obtained police protection for students, built a cloakroom and redecorated the Student Union lounge.
