

SIX F-M Project Is Completed

Rho Epsilon Transmitter Will Be Tested Soon

The F-M transmitter has been completed.

Constructed by Rho Epsilon, honorary radio engineering fraternity, the frequency modulation transmitter is soon to be tested, it was revealed by Ken Black, Rho Epsilon president.

The project was started in the summer of 1942, but the scarcity of critical materials has hampered its progress. Although the transmitter is now ready for operation, it will not be used for standard broadcasting until after the war.

The Federal Communications Commission requires that a monitor, a device used for checking frequency, be used in the transmitter. The monitor cannot be obtained until after the war. Inadequate studio facilities also hamper immediate operation.

Rho Epsilon is continuing plans for the future operation of the transmitter, said Black. Meanwhile it will be used for instruction purposes in the senior radio engineering classes.

Freud to Come Back in March

To Head IIT Chemistry After 2½ Year Leave

Colonel Benjamin Ball Freud, professor of chemistry and chairman of the chemistry department, will return to Illinois Tech March 1, president Henry T. Heald announced today. Dr. Freud has been on a leave of absence since the summer of 1941 in order to serve with the chemical warfare service.

Dr. Freud's return is occasioned by a recent retirement rule which requires that all officers must be retired from active service when they reach the age of sixty.

His assignment was in the sixth regional office of civilian defense as corps area liaison representative.

Upon his return, Dr. Freud will resume his activities as chairman of the chemistry department, replacing Dr. M. J. Murray who has been acting chairman in his absence.

Since 1910, Dr. Freud has been a consulting chemist and chemical engineer. He is also a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Sigma Xi, the American Chemical Society, the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the Society for the promotion of Engineering Education, and the Chicago Chemistry Club.

ITSA Appropriates \$100 For Juke Box Order

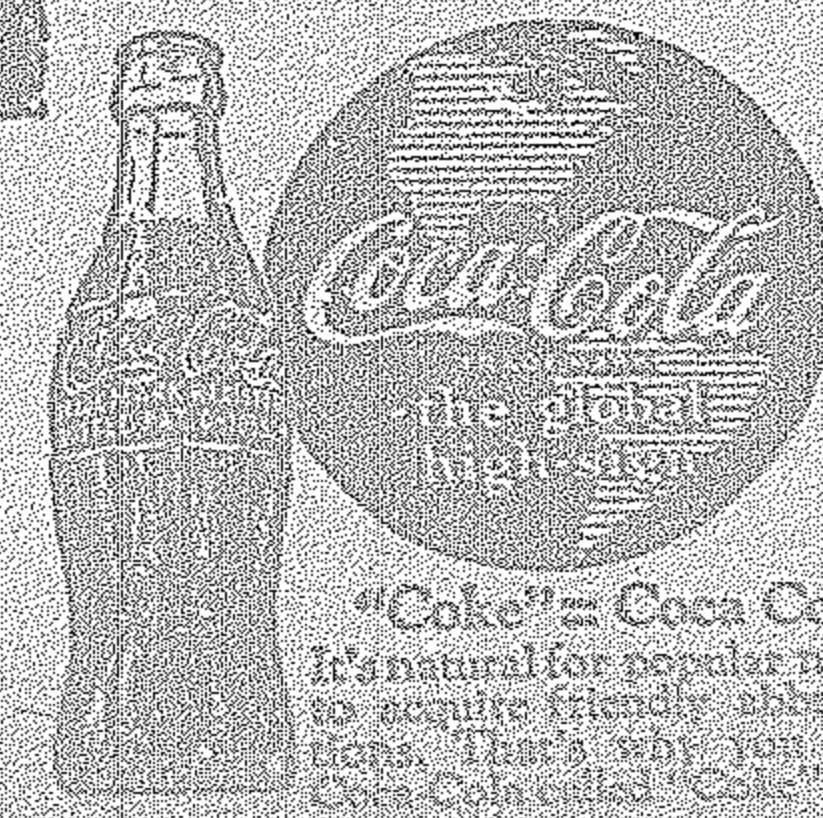
