

Honor Board To Outline Aims

The Honor Board will soon acquaint IIT students with the aims and procedures of the honor system. This was decided upon at Thursday's meeting of the board, according to Vice-president Earl Mills.

An outline of the mechanics of the system was presented to the student body last year in the September 20 issue of *Technology News*. The details will reappear shortly in the form of mimeographed letters, said Mills.

He stated that, "Special emphasis will be placed on the reasons for eliminating cheating in class work, since the board has noticed a reluctance on the part of students to report classmates to the board. This has been due to the fact that the students refuse to turn in the name of a friend on the grounds of fraternal decency. Members of the board agree that turning in the name of a friend does present complications.

"In an effort to make honor a personal responsibility with everyone, the instructions will explain classroom procedure with violators. The board is not eager to question all minor violators, but is more anxious to awaken a sense of personal honor and trust in each student. However, in the face of outrageous cheating or contempt, it has acted, and will act, swiftly and surely to drop the fellow from school."

Schommer posed this question at the meeting. "What happens to seniors being put in 1-A?"

Winston answered that these seniors must be given their 30 days to seek employment in essential war jobs. The job chosen is of utmost importance, said Schommer in an interview after the meeting.

"If a chemical engineer is hired to do a B.T.U. test run on coal, when it is a technician's job and easily filled by elder men or women, he is not eligible for a continued deferment," he pointed out.

The forms filled out at the recent mass meeting about deferments have yielded the following breakdown of civilian February and June seniors:

Eight are 1-A, 183 are 2A or 2B, and thirteen are in class 4-F. "All others" account for seven, while seventeen are pending. Five list themselves as unclassified. Six are already enlisted in the services while one is not registered with the draft.

Civilians under 22 who are classified 1-A must fill out "Form DSS-42 Special" while those over 22 are to fill out "Form DSS-42", said Schommer.

A sufficient number of these forms have not been received by the school, and if each June and February graduate will obtain a form from his local draft board and fill them out, the school will send the forms to the National Roster," said Peebles.

John Schommer will speak to the seniors at a meeting Wednesday, Feb. 2 in the Auditorium. The meeting begins at 11:30 a. m.

Gail to Leave At Term's End

Professor Albert Gail revealed today that he will leave IIT at the close of this term.

The reason for his leaving is his return to the aircraft industry when, on March 1, he will become aerodynamicist for the McDonnell Aircraft Co., of St. Louis, Mo.

Professor Gail has been at IIT since September, 1942. After coming to this country in 1937, Gail engaged in flight research for United Airlines until 1940, and then taught at Georgia Tech, Minnesota, and Michigan Universities before coming to IIT.

According to Dean James C. Peebles, Professor Gail's departure will not alter the aeronautical options being given at present. Professor E. I. Feisenheiser, he stated, will take over the work in stress analysis and aerodynamics, while Professor Daniel Roesch will continue the course in aircraft engines. E. H. Palowski will continue with the practical aircraft design work.

Peebles stated that the scope of the aeronautical curriculum will follow the demands of industry.

Faculty Club Elects Hendricks President

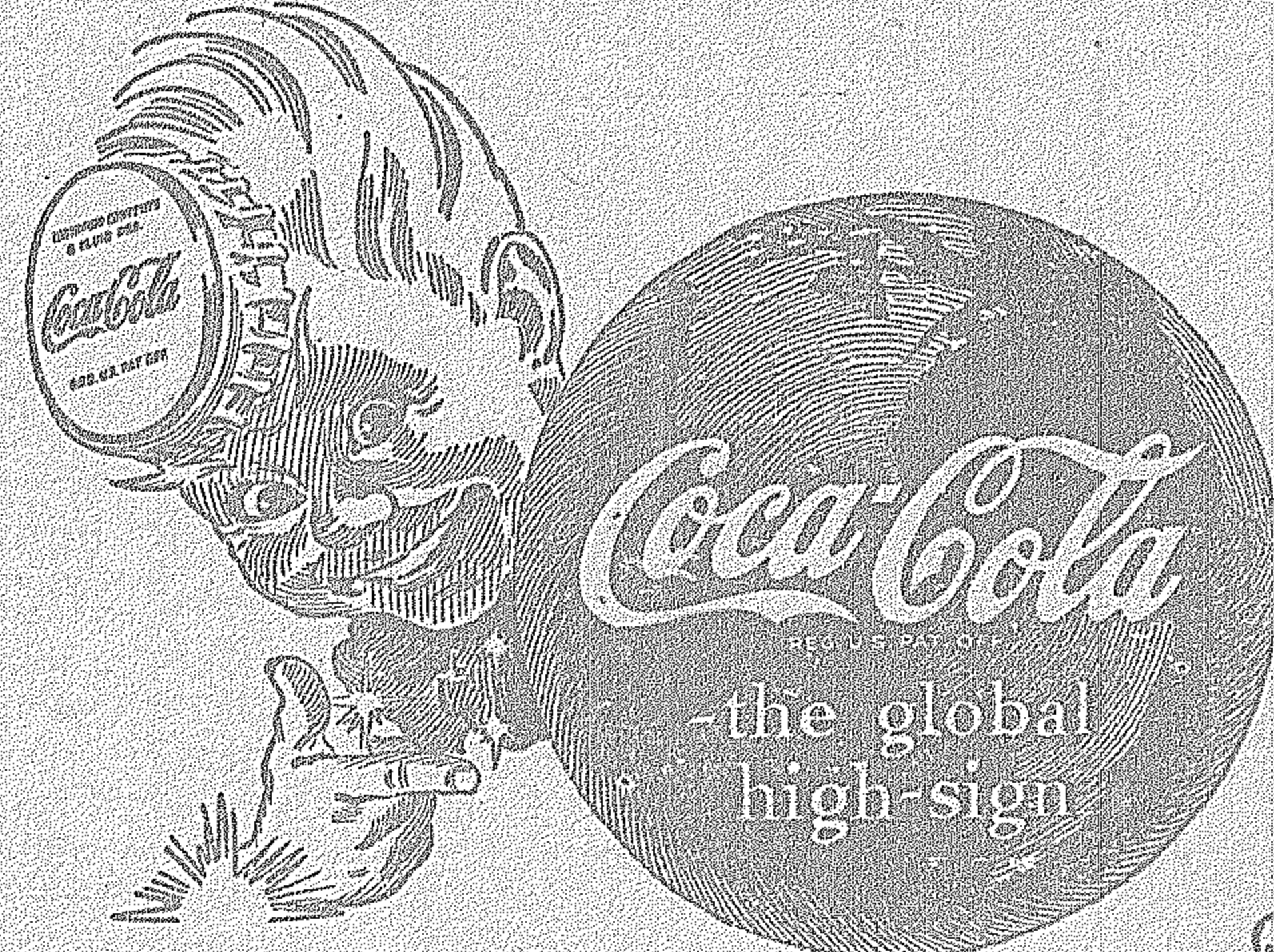
