

Schommer Explains Present Selective Service Procedure

The procedure which follows when a local board considers the deferment of an engineering student was clarified Friday by John J. Schommer, placement director.

Schommer said: "On receipt of the report by the local board on which it is certified by the National Roster of Scientific and Specialized Personnel that the student has made the quota, the local board must reopen the case."

"However, the local board is all-powerful and may be swayed either by social pressure, lack of intelligence, or prejudice against a young student because he is not in the armed services, and still has the authority to classify the registrant 1A—you can take it from me, they are doing that very thing."

"This procedure in reclassifying a student who is O.K'd by the Roster means that recourse for ironing out this situation lies in writing an appeal to the appeal board and asking the cooperation of the state director against adamant local boards."

"There are now a number of appeal cases before the appeal boards but at this date I have received no word on the disposition of these cases."

"The social pressure is so strong regarding the plea, 'save the fathers', that some boards cannot see their way clear to defer students pursuing critical courses. The local boards openly state that they want appeal boards and the state director to assume responsibility for deferring college students."

Consolidated Vultee Aircraft to Sponsor Specialized Training Program at Illinois Tech

Consolidated Vultee Aircraft Corporation has chosen Illinois Institute of Technology to give all of its specialized full-time training for workers from all over the United States, it was announced today by John I. Yellott, director of war training at Illinois.

First classes under the new set-up will begin today. Approximately 40 people will be permitted to enroll.

The trainees are paid salaries by Consolidated Vultee while they take the course. Upon completing the training, they go directly to work in one of the corporation's plants.

The Consolidated Vultee trainees are part of 45,000 persons who have enrolled in Illinois Tech's war training courses since the program began three years ago. These 45,000 give Illinois Tech the record of conducting the largest war training program in a single city in the nation and the largest at a privately-operated college.

A final effort in the Navy V-12 Red Cross drive will be made today. The men, who will be approached by the Master-at-arms of each quarter will be asked to contribute as much as they can afford.
