

SIX IIT Music Clubs to Entertain Disabled Vets and War Workers in Milwaukee

A full day in Milwaukee will be spent by the musical clubs of Illinois Tech, Thursday, when the orchestra, navy band, and the glee club will give three separate concerts.

One of the concerts, according to O. Gordon Erickson, director of the clubs, will be given at the soldiers home for returned war casualties which is located in the city. The remaining two concerts will be presented at the Allis-Chalmers plant. The navy band will play for the employees during the noon hour while the orchestra and glee club will perform for the executives of the plant.

These concerts will be preceded by an inspection of the plant by the members of the musical clubs. This will be carried out under the most strict rules. Civilians will be required to present birth certificates or other suitable identification in order to enter.

In the afternoon the club members will visit the Pabst Brewery after which refreshments will be served. The students will be free to visit Milwaukee on their own following the brewery inspection until 8 p.m. when they will return via the North Shore Electroliner.

As the group will leave Chicago at 8 a.m. navy men will receive their morning meal at 7.

Rifle Club to Hold Marksman Course

The Rifle Club will sponsor a pre-induction training course in rifle marksmanship under standards set up by the armed services, according to Charles E. Martin, coach of the group.

Martin said that the Tuesday morning training group is filled and that other groups are being planned for Thursdays at 9:30 and 11:30 a.m.

The regular meeting of the organization is Friday at 1:30 but a special meeting for navy men will be held at 5:30 p.m. on Thursdays in the rifle range, second entrance, basement Physics.

The club is still open for membership because of the fact that they recently received 10,000 rounds of target ammunition.

Kepner Resigns As Registrar

Dr. Charles E. Kepner, registrar, has handed in his resignation, which will be effective as of today, according to Dean James C. Peebles.

Dr. Kepner came to IIT in June 1943. Recognized as an authority on educational administrative procedures, he studied education systems in the Orient and in Europe before the war.

Dean Peebles said that Ernest Kelly is now registrar and that there would probably be no more additions to the registrar office's staff.

Robinson, for many years the instructor in the fire protection engineering laboratory at Underwriters' Laboratories, has taken over the work in underwriter's standards and the senior engineering course.

Dr. Sanford B. Meech has assumed Prof. Finnegan's duties as editor of the "Engineer and Alumnus," and will use the office at 41 West 33rd Street for preparation of the forthcoming issue. Thomas A. Hunter, a graduate of the department in 1940, has taken over the instruction of the junior class in engineering. An instructor for the junior course in fire insurance practice is being arranged for by Mr. K. H. Parker of the Western Actuarial Bureau.

Dutton and Larkin Attend Conference

Dutton was chairman of the conference, where some of the other topics under consideration were how industry will find places for returning veterans and what has been learned from the war about training and motivating people.

Post-War Groups Plan New Curricula

Illinois Tech's Postwar Planning Committees are formulating plans for the administration of the curricula of IIT after the war.

The engineering committee has submitted to the administration a recommendation concerning returning soldiers, according to Dr. Myril B. Reed, committee chairman.

An important aspect under discussion is the possibility of having an official channel through which students and faculty can make suggestions to the administration. Also under discussion is a system whereby the faculty and students can be kept informed of affairs of the school. These questions are but a small part of the proposed changes. More can be made public when some recommendations are adopted by the Institute, Dr. Reed said.

Gray and Blue Will Be Colors of ARF Vehicles

One color scheme will distinguish all Armour Research Foundation rolling stock, stated Dr. Francis W. Godwin, assistant director of the Foundation. The various vehicles will be gray, with a horizontal blue stripe along the sides. The lettering will be red.

First unit to be painted will be the Foundation's 1½ ton truck, followed by the Mobile Stress Analysis Unit and the Mobile X-Ray Diffraction Unit. The new Pontiac sedan recently acquired by the Foundation will be painted last.

A special ITSA committee was appointed to aid the students in putting the system into operation. At a special assembly students will have a chance to find out the details of the system as well as an opportunity to discuss the pros and cons of it. Following this, an election will be held in which the students can decide whether or not they want to install the system.

The committee members are Marc Heidmann, Honor Board chairman; Viola Sievers; Lorrene Matern, Lewis ITSA representative; and Tom Kilgariff and Don Hedeon, who are members of both the Honor Board and the ITSA.

The procedure to be followed in presenting the matter to the Lewis student body is similar to that used when the system was first adopted on the south campus. After two assemblies in which the matter was heatedly discussed, the students voted to give the honor system a month's trial. At the end of that time, they voted to adopt it permanently.

The ITSA decided to do away with the month's trial in the present case because the students already have a good idea of the system's effectiveness from observing its operation on the south campus.

However, the last violent rush was held in the spring of 1942, after which time it was felt that it was such proceedings were unsuitable for students in a nation at war. Since that time the class contests have been in the form of athletic games.
