RECEIVES "EXCELLENT" SCORES

Technology News received "excellent" scores on the following: balance of news values and sources, vitality of news values and sources, treatment of news, content of news stories, feature stories, make-up, printing, editorial page features, editorial page make-up, sports coverage, sports writing, and sports display.

The paper's lowest ratings were received in leads, interviews, speech reports, and headlines, where it received only scores of "good." In all, there were six groups of scores for each division, poor, weak, fair, good, very good, and excellent. There were 28 divisions in the scorebook.

Paper's judged in the contest were those of the fall term. Cited in the scorebook were examples from the Dec. 6, Dec. 20, Jan. 10 and Jan. 17 issues.

FOLLOWS JOURNALISM CLASSES

Milton Burkart was editor of *Technology News* at that time. The paper's winning of the all-American award climaxed the reorganization of *Technology News* which took place a year ago last month. Technology News will receive a certificate of award showing it to be an all-American. This will be framed and placed in the newspaper office.
