

10 IIT Freshman Scholarships Awarded; Cook Fund Also Announces 12 Winners

The ten winners of the IIT freshman scholarship examination and their alternates were announced last week by Dean C. A. Tibbals. The 12 recipients of the William J. Cook scholarship award, and two others who were awarded scholarships for the coming term were also announced.

The freshman scholarship winners and the high schools from which they are graduating are: Bernard Brenner, Roosevelt; Jona Cohn, Harper; Milton Cox, Oak Park; Robert Forney, Taft; Paul Kirk, Leo; Grant Medin, South Shore; Ronald Morris, Austin; Roy Radner, Hyde Park; Leo Schmidt, Steinmetz; and Jay Warshawsky, Roosevelt.

These students, all of whom were in the upper half of their high school graduating classes, ranked highest among the 140 students who took the exam recently. The awards are all in the amount of \$350, of which \$150 will cover this term's tuition, and \$200 will provide for next semester's tuition and fees.

Twelve three-term freshman scholarships, in varying amounts, have been awarded under the William J. Cook Fund, administered by the Chicago Community trust to students of Cook County. The men are Sam Altschuler, James Anderson, Wyatt Coon, John Dalenberg, Charles Padgett, Clifford Pedersen, Robert Pohl, Baruch Rabinowitz, Frank Roubik, David Schwartz, Joseph Soldat, and Richard Stark.

The La Verne Noyes scholarship, for the descendants of veterans of the last war, has been awarded to Alvin Epstein, of Von Steuben High School. Also, Leonard Reiffel, of Roosevelt High School, will receive a scholarship as a result of having received honorable mention in the Science Talent Search, conducted by Westinghouse and "Science Service". Reiffel also took the freshman scholarship, on which he made a good score, according to Dean C. A. Tibbals. Both of these scholarships are for one semester, at the end of which time they may be renewed, depending on the student's work during next term.
