Student War Council Disbanded; ITSA Acts on Negele's Request

The Student War Council was disbanded officially at the July 12 meeting of the ITSA.

This action was taken by the ITSA on the recommendation of A/S Bob Negele, president of the War Council. Negele explained that the Red Cross had issued a directive in April which banned group donations of blood where the groups were composed largely of donors under 21 years of age. This ban therefore applied directly to Illinois Tech with its undergraduate enrollment.

In view of the fact that the Blood Campaign was the main semester activity of SWC, the continuation of the Council seemed useless.

However, the War Council was not totally inactive last semester for it helped the administration, Research Foundation, and the navy to mass a total of \$3780.00 for the Red Cross War Relief Fund. Several students remember the "ravages" wrought by the Female Class Raiders.

Negele also stated that the fine work done by the Student War Council since its conception in early 1942 should not be marred by a non-active group now.

Looking back over the Council's record the following stands out. Under the initial chairmanship of Ray Smith, the SWC arranged for the proper precautions during air raids, started the scrap campaign which resulted in dismantling the Ogden Field fence, and brought the Red Cross Mobile Unit to IIT for the first time.

The blood drive came to be the chief activity of the Council under Harry Gillespie's leadership. Over a thousand pints of blood was collected through the Council's effort. Several other projects, such as the installation of an air raid whistle, assistance in ration registration and a rifle course were undertaken.

2 New Pharmacist Mates Come to IIT

Two new pharmacists mates have been added to the Navy V-12 unit stationed at Illinois Institute of Technology. They are third class petty officers William R. Bair and David Franklin Bahner.

Bair has been in the Navy seven months while Bahner has been in for sixteen months. Also, Bair was a pharmacist in a drugstore in civilian life. Bahner was a clerk in an office.

Both received their boot training and ratings at Great Lakes, Illinois.

Lewis Lounge Still Requires Furniture

The Lewis lounge has been completed; the only remaining item is the addition of some furniture. All of the painting, partitioning and decorating has been finished and it is reputed to be a delightful place.

The committee, headed by Dr. Ruth Clouse is working to get it ready for use by students and other groups. The grand opening of the lounge will be within a week or ten days, provided that the furniture which has been promised arrives on time.

At a recent dinner Dean Dutton was presented with a gold key for distinguished service to management and the society. This is the first such award made and was presented with a citation for outstanding activities in the society, and achievement as a teacher, author, and consultant in the field of management.

Dean Dutton has served as chairman of the society at the national spring conference which met April 28th and 29th in Chicago. At present he is chairman of the department of business and economics, and the department of industrial engineering. He is also a member of many important societies. Dean Dutton has been at Illinois Institute of Technology since 1933, when he entered as a lecturer in business management.

92,000 Copies of New Edition of TD Text Sold

Included also is an additional chapter on aeronautical drafting. This material was formerly published under separate cover as a supplement to the text.

Additional washing machines are on order for some of the trainees in quarters #2, #6, and George Williams.

Mangold's Son Enters Annapolis at Seventeen

John F. Mangold, Jr., son of John F. Mangold of the Mechanics Department, was officially enrolled at the Naval Academy at Annapolis last Tuesday.

Mangold Jr. is seventeen and one-half years old. He is a graduate of Lyon's Township High School where he played football and wrestled, as well as being one of the honor students of the school.

He was awarded a congressional nomination last February. On April 19, he took the mental exams. At the Academy he will take the regular four year course, abbreviated to three years. The first year of college is standard at the Academy and the last two are devoted to specialization. He hasn't decided on any major, as yet.

All of the fleet veterans were first, second, or third class petty officers. Their previous jobs ranged from parachute rigger to ship's musician. Three are from Chicago.

A/S Gene Schaafsma spent 13 of his 29 months' service with the fleet. He participated in two major campaigns in the southwest Pacific as an electrician's mate 2/c on an attack transport. A/S George Marzeck and A/S Sigismund Pyzick served with the fleet as aviation machinist's mate 3/c and electrician's mate 2/c respectively.

Former parachute rigger 1/c Arthur W. Boettcher holds the longest service record with the fleet of the 30 veterans. He began his sea duty in October, 1941.

Bringing music to a battleship's crew has been the duty of A/S Homer W. Wickham who boasts a service record of two and one-half years. As a musician 2/c, he played tenor saxophone and clarinet in the ship's band.

Besides the fleet are transfers from other V-12 units and Great Lakes. In addition to these are high school graduates who have won Navy V-12 appointments through competitive examinations.

With the addition of the 89 new apprentice seamen, Illinois Tech's Navy V-12 unit includes 690 men.

Former IIT Professor Receives AIChE Award

Dr. Olaf Hougen, former professor at IIT, was presented with the AIChE Award at the semi-annual meeting of the American Institute of Chemical Engineering on May 16, 1944 at Cleveland.

The award was given for the best series of published papers presented to the AIChE during the prior year. This award has been presented annually by the AIChE for the past six years.

Dr. Hougen was assisted in his work by three former students of IIT. These men were Gamson, Marshall, and Phodos, and all are graduates of Armour.

SPEE Elects Prof. I. Hill To Executive Committee

Newly elected to the executive committee of the SPEE is Professor Ivan L. Hill, of the technical drawing department. He was elected to office during the convention which was held in Cincinnati, Ohio from June 22 to June 25. The duration of this position is four years.
