

SIX New IE Course to Begin Next Term

An elective course in valuation and appraisal will be given next semester by Max Fuhrer, member of the firm of Eugene and Max Fuhrer, architects and engineers.

The course will cover basic concepts in building replacement cost, land value and rent, interest and capitalization of values, business cycles and valuation of real estate.

The completion of the course in freshman economics is a prerequisite for the course. It will meet once or twice a week with hours to be arranged.

Fuhrer is an author of a valuation manual, used by real estate authorities in Chicago and elsewhere. He is a graduate of IIT, receiving a Bachelor of Science degree in mechanical engineering in May 1923. He has specialized in the field of real estate valuation and has handled many cases.

Martin Will Leave At End of Term

Owing to the closing down of the welding laboratory at the end of this semester, Charles E. Martin will leave Illinois Tech after four years as welding instructor.

He will take a new position in the employ of a well-known manufacturer of welding equipment. His new work will be similar to his duties here in that he will continue to teach.

The reason for the closing down of the welding lab is the overall plan of the Institute to convert the present academic program over to the V-12 program. In the navy program an attempt is made to minimize laboratory work.

This was started last semester when the foundry lab on the fourth floor in Machinery Hall was closed down. The same procedure will follow with the welding lab although much new machinery had been purchased and a new ventilation system has been planned.

Heald Will Attend Urban Universities Conference

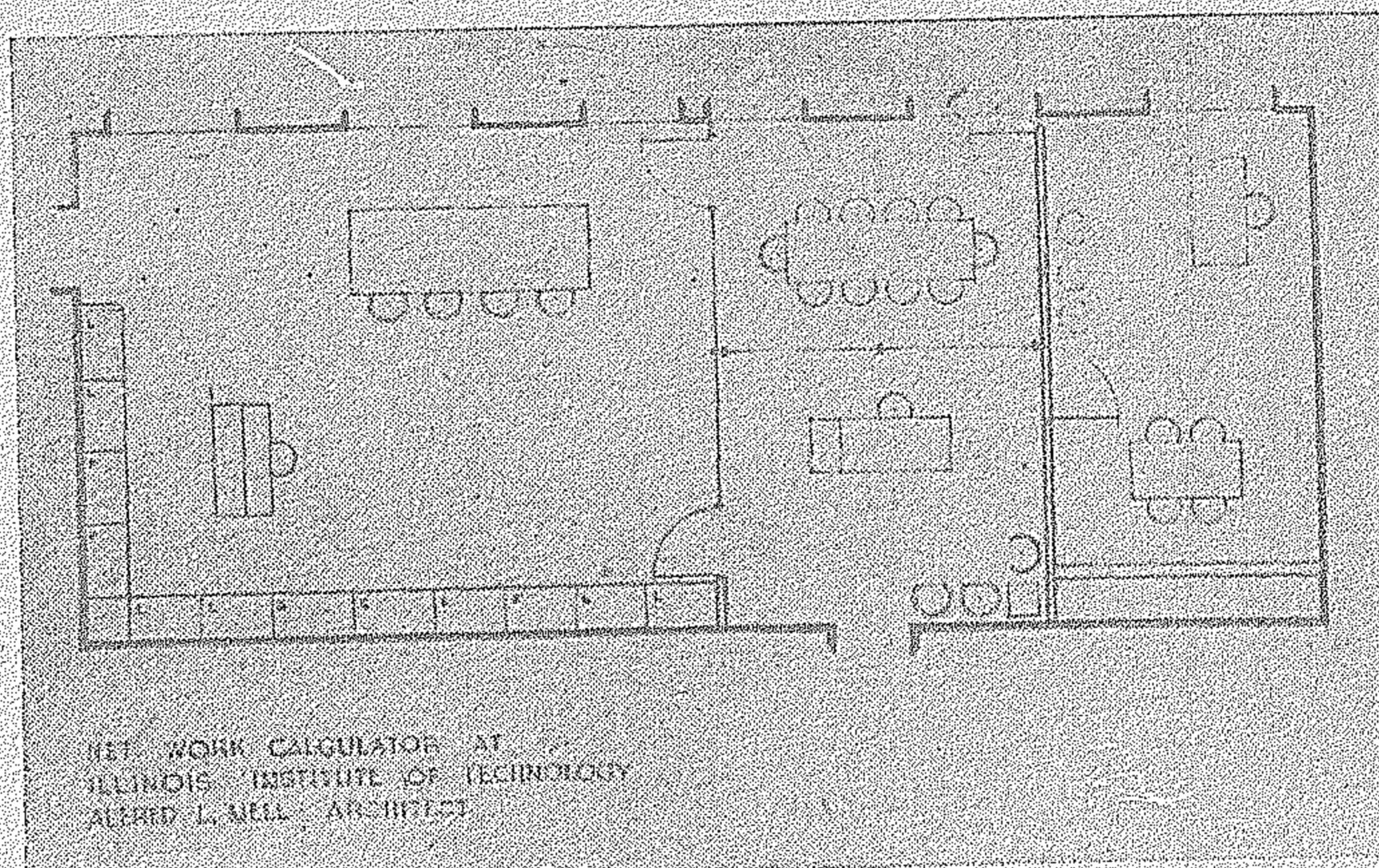

Dripping Water Causes Large Damage To Switchboard, Office, and Stockroom

Damage estimated at \$1000 was caused by an accident in the special methods chemical laboratory on the fourth floor of Main last week.

The trouble started when two students left the lab last Saturday afternoon. All the water valves were shut down except the main one for the room. It so happened that some of the small valves on the line were loose and turned on when pushed downward. When the main pressure was shut off that night, one of these valves dropped to the open position. Accordingly, when the pressure resumed Sunday morning, the water rushed out unimpeded into a condensing column on a piece of apparatus. The return tubing was knocked off by the pressure from the top of the column. This went on all Sunday.

This water dripped through the floor to the chemistry stock room, where damage was done to chemicals. The water went on through the floor to Professor Charles Nash's office on the second floor. A desk was ruined in his office.

The non-stopping water continued to flow down the walls, destroying plaster as it went down. Getting to the first floor, the water dripped on the switchboard, soaking its parts.

Two men have been working steadily repairing the switchboard, although another board was installed temporarily. The telephone company had another such section of switchboard in stock which could be installed temporarily while the other one was being fixed. If this had not been available, the school would have been without telephone service for two weeks.

Comptroller Leaves IIT Business Office

Parrish was former comptroller of the institute and worked here about three years. He is a certified public accountant and will set up practice in his home town, which is Paris, Illinois.
