

# Soph-Isticates Come to Fore; Knock Off Tough Junior Mechs

Matching the league-leading Senior Chems game for game, the Soph-Isticates defeated the Frosh Socks 18-8 and the former champion Junior Mechs 4-3.

In the Junior Mech game a four hit rally in the first of the seventh on the part of the Soph-Isticates resulted in their overcoming the 3-2 advantage of the Mechs.

Henry Pye continued in his scorching batting spree by pounding out three hits. His present average is around .700.

The other win of the week was an easy victory over the Frosh Socks with Len Gost leading the attack with five hits in five times at the plate.

The Senior Chems maintained their undefeated record by beating the Frosh Flashes 9-5. The Flashes scored their five runs in the first two innings, after which repeated errors resulted in their giving the game to the Chems.

The second-place Senior Mechs won their only game of the week by defeating the Frosh Rats 14-7. Bill Nordhouse highlighted the underdogs with a home-run with one man on base.

Offsetting the previous loss earlier in the week, the Junior Mechs defeated the Junior Chems 12-6. A/S Ray Bojanowski was the big gun in the Mechs batting attack with a perfect day at the plate.

The visitors to the south-side campus, the Lewisites, won their first game in four starts by outscoring the cellar team, the Frosh Socks, 17-12.

In the last game of the week the Senior Chems overwhelmed the Lewisites to the tune of 20-3. Leading the Chem's attack was A/S Ralph Maybaum with a home run, triple, double, and a single in four times at the plate.

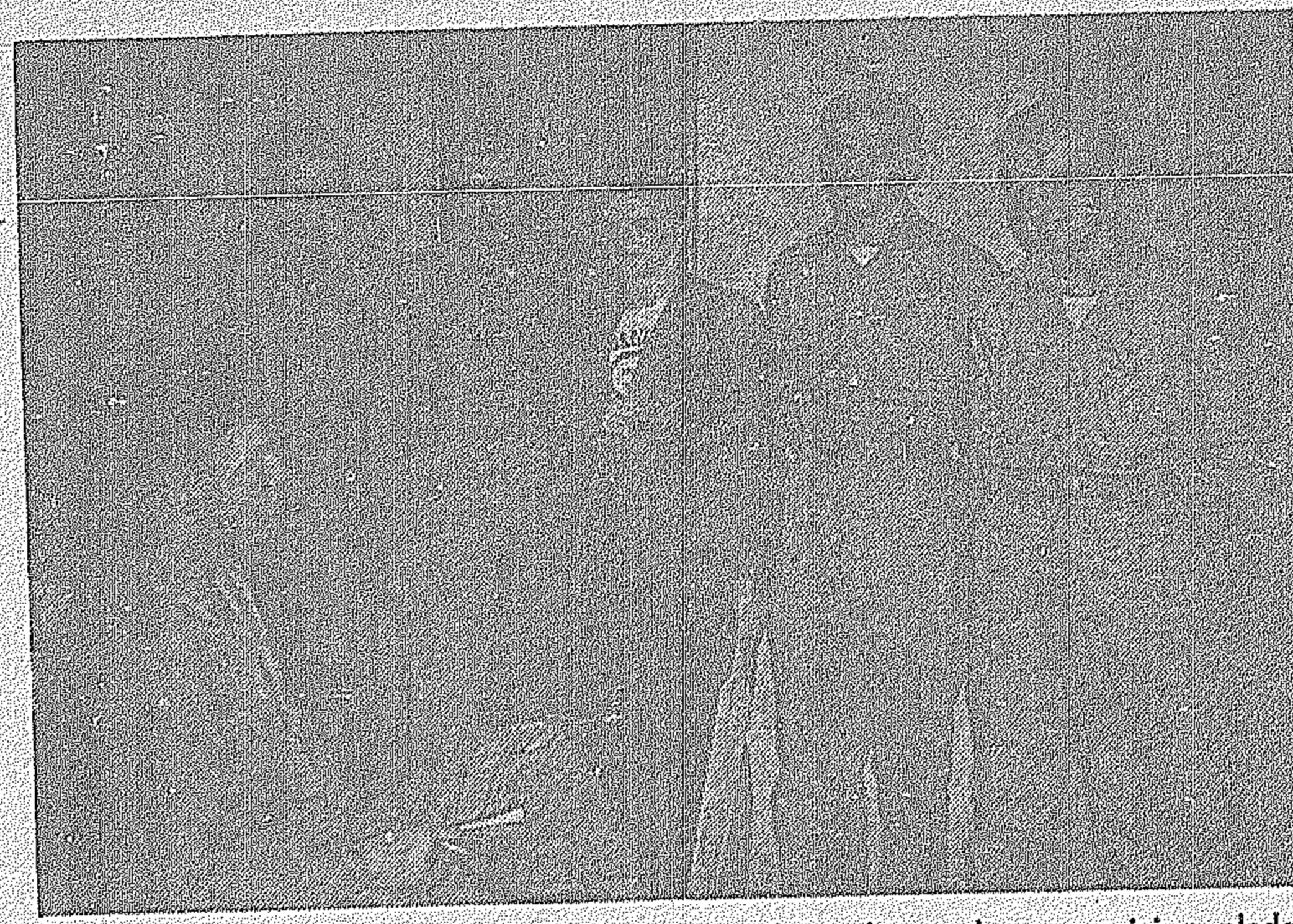
