Forty men turned out for wrestling last week and this is undoubtedly a very large number as compared to other turnouts in past years. There are three letter men returning to the team, including Captain Vick Mieszkowski, Don Albert, and Roy Churan.

Many of the fellows out for the team have just transferred to the south campus from George Williams, where they had been stationed previously.

Last year Don Albert and Don Johnson came in second in the AAU tournament. Albert was in the 128 pound class and Johnson in the 155 pound class. The other lettermen, Mieszkowski and Churan, wrestle in the 175 pound and 135 pound class, respectively.

Definite dates for matches have not been set as yet, but invitations have been extended to Northwestern, Wheaton, Illinois Normal, Illinois, Michigan, Michigan State, University of Chicago and Navy Pier.

Members of the class are especially interested in conversation.

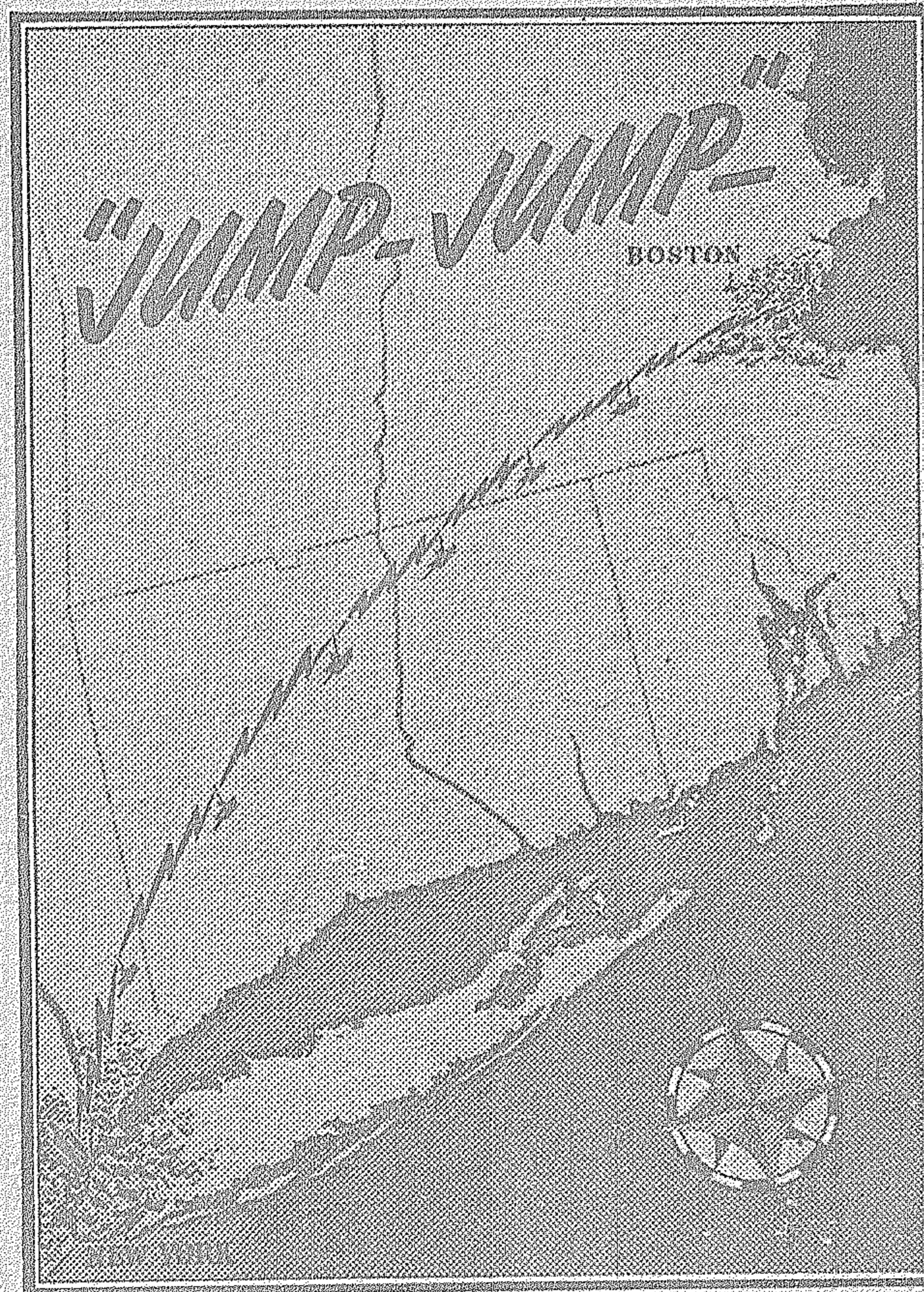
President Henry T. Heald will give a brief report, and IIT's glee club and orchestra will compose the remainder of the program. George Von Gahr will serve as chairman.

NEW RADIO RELAY LINK FOR TELEPHONE AND TELEVISION

Tiny radio waves, shorter than any used before in commercial telephony, will link New York and Boston in a new experimental "jump-jump" relay system for the transmission of telephone speech and television programs.

These waves travel in straight lines like beams of light. Because of the earth's curvature, the distance will be spanned in a series of straight-line jumps between transmitting and receiving stations about 30 miles apart.

The Bell System plans post-war improvements in ways like this, to extend its nation-wide service by providing more Long Distance telephone facilities for peacetime needs.

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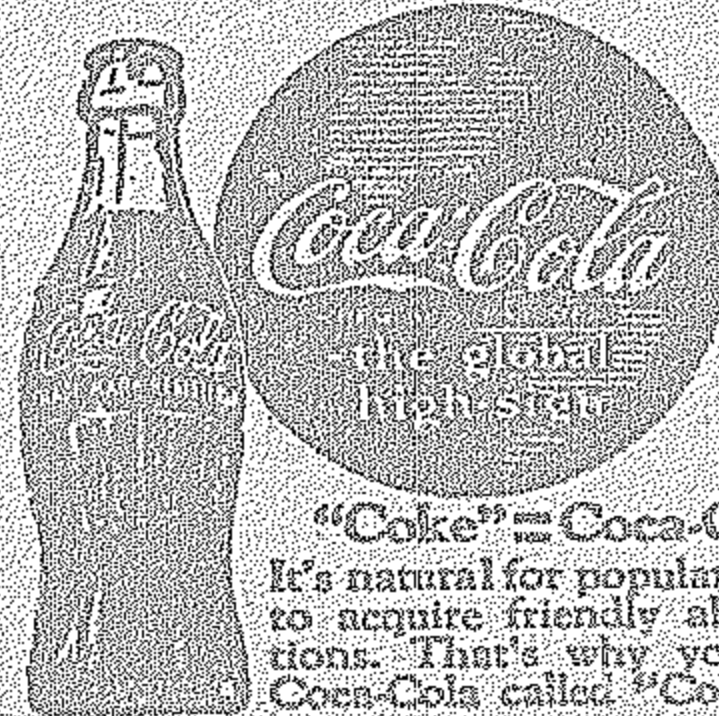
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
