Quarters #7

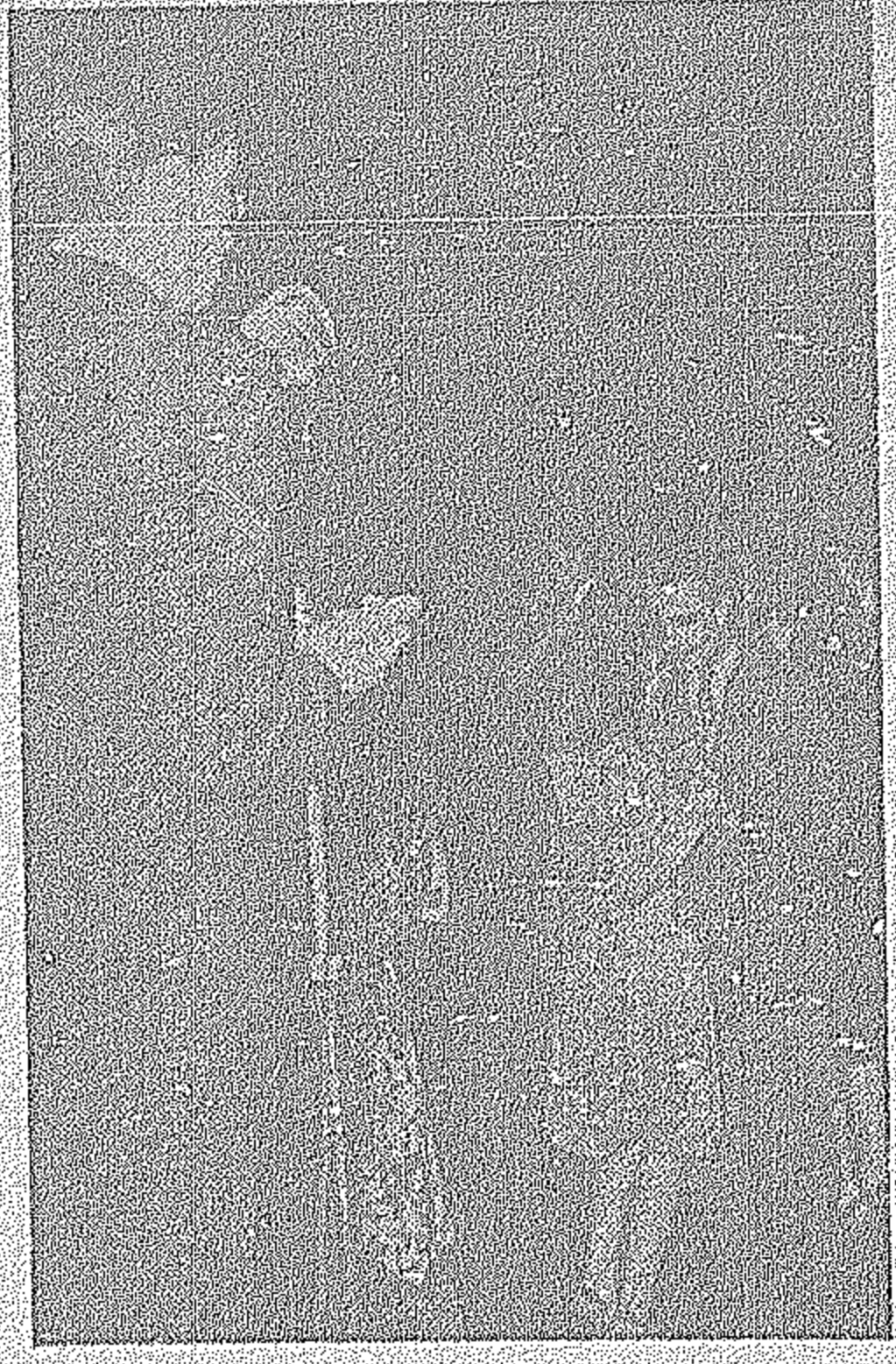

Lewis Sophomores Plan Dinner-Theater Party

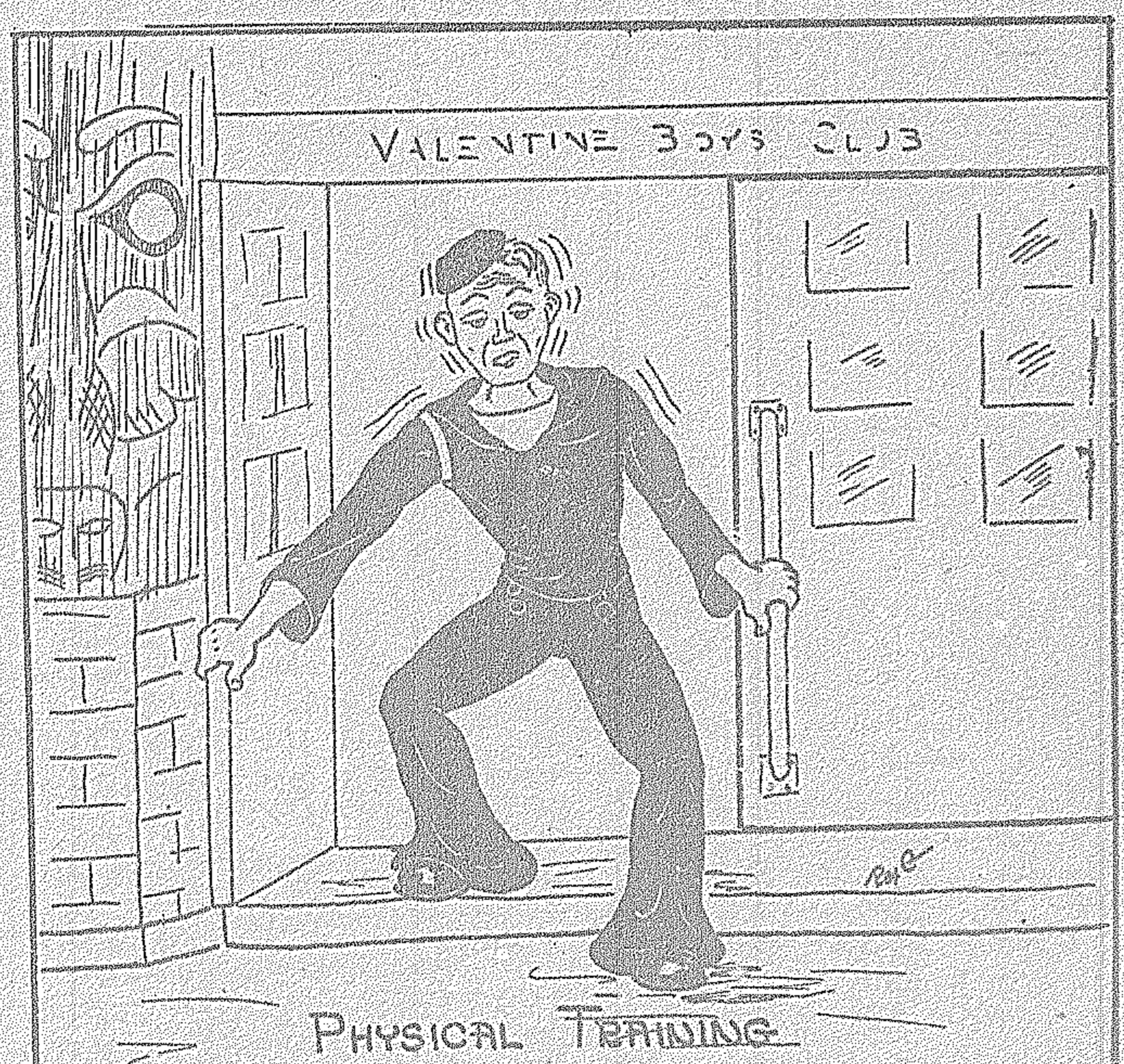
