Re-examination Of 4-F's Likely

Need for Younger Men Called Urgent by Army

IIT students who have been rejected by selective service for minor physical disabilities face the prospect of re-examination and induction into the armed forces, revealed John J. Schommer, selective service adviser, today. This condition was brought about by the fact that armed forces are seeking young men and are at the same time releasing older men.

Selective service officials are apparently of the opinion that many men who were rejected might still be qualified for service at least in some capacity, according to Schommer. Since the physical standards have been lowered there is considerable likelihood that this new selective service policy will involve many IIT students who were rejected on borderline causes.

If a man is accepted for military service now, he will be inducted into the armed forces regardless of what his position is in school. This means that it is not possible to obtain a deferment as an engineering student.

In the summer of 1943 the engineering students had 289 deferments cancelled. This had quite a serious effect on the enrollment of IIT. This new selective service policy, although it does not involve as many people, may have a telling effect on the number of students.

Novy Elected Head Of Music Honorary

Raymond Novy has been recently elected president of the Pi Nu Epsilon, honorary musical fraternity. The other officers that were elected are: vice-president, A/S Eugene Hoppe; secretary, A/S Howard Cook; treasurer, A/S Ray Olson. All of the men are ME students.

As a captain in the first World War attached to the Ordnance Department, he did research on high explosives and projectile loading. He is now a reserve captain and is consulting expert on explosives to the Safety and Security Branch of
