This lecture on "Boogie Woogie" was given by Dr. Hayakawa at a Kiwa meeting several semesters ago. However, many students have not heard it, so he is obliging their request to repeat it.

Roy Patrick Barbers 33 Years; Started Career in U. S. Army

Pat, the barber, formerly known as Roy Patrick, and in his own words, "the tonsorial artiste", is an orphan. Born on Chicago's South Side on July 20, 1893, Pat graduated from grammar school and decided upon a career in the army.

He enlisted in 1913 at the age of 20 and joined the famous 1st Division, based in Texas. The commanding general at that time was General Frederick Fonston. A year later trouble was brewing across the border in Vera Cruz, Mexico, and Fonston's 1st Division was sent with a marine division to quell the riots that had broken out in that city. Pat was there.

Shortly after the United States entered World War I in April, 1917, the 1st Division was shipped out to England. In June, 1917, Pat landed in France, due to spend two years and nine days on duty there. During this time, he saw action in the famous Ypres salient, the Soissons battle, and in the St. Mihiel offensive.

Shortly after the battle of St. Mihiel in 1918, the 1st Division was shifted to the Argonne Forest sector in preparation for the onslaught there. It was here that Pat was selected as an officer candidate.

Taking up the occupation he learned in the army, Pat became a "tonsorial artiste" as a civilian, and has practiced for 33 years at Chicago's Union League Club and the University Club. He has barbered for President Heald for 9 years, and formerly trimmed and shaved John Schommer and Dr. McCormack, of IIT. His most famous customer was former President Hoover, whom he shaved at the University Club. FBI boss J. Edgar Hoover also patronized him. Says Pat, "Best man I ever shaved—a two-bit shave and six-bit tip."

The Union League Club also brought him famous customers; among whom were former Governor Lowdon of Illinois, and James Simpson, who was president of Marshall Field and Company at that time.

That's the guy that used to give me five bucks every time I took care of him," said Pat.

Before Pat took his present job, he served as assistant manager of the University Club for seven years. In July, 1943, the V-12 unit at IIT got under way and Pat was called in to keep the men clean cut.

Pat's home is at 5958 West Superior, Chicago. He has one child, six-year old Lois, who had her picture published as a style queen in the Easter Parade of 1945.

The thought of retirement has not entered Pat's head. His idea of an ideal "retirement" is to become chief tonsorial expert at IIT's new SU building, and to take care of President Heald. The "barbers" can do the heavy work. "No," Pat says, "once in the game, always in the game. Very few barbers ever retire."

New Scholarship Exams Given to 146 Students
Freshman scholarship examinations were given to 146 persons, according to Dr. W. W. Colvert, chairman of the freshman scholarship committee.

The examination was of a different type from ones previously given. It consisted of two parts, the first measuring mental ability at the college level and the second indicating achievement in high school. The second test was divided into four parts, i. e. English and literature, mathematics, science, and social studies. From result of these tests, a measure of personality characteristic will be taken.

In addition to the 146 Chicago-land students given the tests, several out-of-town aspirants took the examination by mail.

Winners of the scholarships, who will be announced by the committee this week, may choose either a liberal arts or an engineering curriculum at the institute.
