

THE ITSA has operated, as far as I know, without any rules of order since its conception. At the last meeting, Lillian Seges courageously tried to have Robert's Rules of Order adopted. She stated that it is necessary to adopt these to prevent domination from the head of the table where President Hedeens sits. If rules were adopted, it would restrict the president from dictating discussions into his own channels. With Robert's Rules of Order the president would have to restrict his remarks or give up the gavel.

Realizing that this addition to the bylaws would be dangerous to the four horsemen, they began bringing pressure to keep it from a vote. In the midst of the discussion, Hedeens asked if there was a motion to adjourn. He was thwarted in this move by general objections of the majority present.

Seeing that they could not avoid the issue, Bob Freund claimed that the constitution requires notice of action on a bylaw to "... be brought up at a previous meeting". Freund interpreted this to mean at the meeting preceding the last. Since it had not been brought up at the previous meeting, but at a meeting last semester, Freund ruled that the motion could not be voted on at the meeting.

It is Freund's constitutional right to interpret the constitution but, at the same time, it is his duty as a judge to give the customary decision as is given by other groups with similar provisions. In other words he did not follow precedent, but instead gave a decision which had as its purpose only to achieve his ends.

Seniors To Order Announcements

All graduating seniors are requested to place their orders for announcements in Bernard Weissman's office in the Student Union before next Friday evening, stated announcement committee chairman, Tom Kilgariff, today.

Following a class meeting held last Friday, it was decided that both booklet and sheet announcements would be ordered along with the invitations. In ordering, a student may select either the booklets alone or the sheet announcements alone or he may order some of each as he so desires.

Samples will be placed in both Weissman's office and the intramural showcase in the lobby of the Student Union.

The booklets serve the same purpose as announcements and are used by many colleges for this purpose. This will be the first time in several years that such booklets will be used by a graduating class at Illinois Tech.

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ITSA Will Back Navy V-12 Ball

Navy Welfare Fund to Donate at Least \$400

The Navy Ball is to be sponsored by the ITSA. This was decided at a special meeting of the Board held at the request of the dance committee last Thursday.

The change was necessitated by the desire of Lt. Sessions to keep it an all school affair, and the impracticability of an individual officer shouldering the risks involved. Thus the dance, as an all school function, was brought under the jurisdiction of the ITSA.

The same arrangements, as were announced in last week's *Technology News*, will be kept. The Ball will definitely be held on May 19, at the Steven's Grand Ballroom. Henry Brandon's orchestra has been contracted to play.

The committee stated that the Board is to be congratulated for their swift action in support of the ball.

The Navy Welfare Fund contribution of \$400 will be turned over to the ITSA fund and used expressly for the Navy Ball. This contribution has made possible the sale of bids at the price of \$3.00 instead of at a higher figure.

The dance committee has been enlarged to include Don Albert, senior ITSA representative. A/S Jack Wright and A/S Wit Kosicki have been appointed by the Board to continue as co-chairmen.

Bids will be on sale daily in the Student Union lobby between 11:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Receipts will be given out in place of tickets. Souvenir bids will be given out upon presentation of the receipts at the entrance to the Ball, said A/S Allan Kukral, committeeman in charge of bids.

In order to prevent individual interpretations of the designation, "semi-formal", the dance committee has announced that all ladies should wear formal dress, civilian men business suits.

The confusion during the past week in settling the date of the Navy Ball resulted from the urgent request of the Midshipmen's School at Northwestern to change the date. Because of the great opposition demonstrated by the men, the date was left as planned at the Stevens Ballroom.

Peace-Time Program Resumed at Lewis

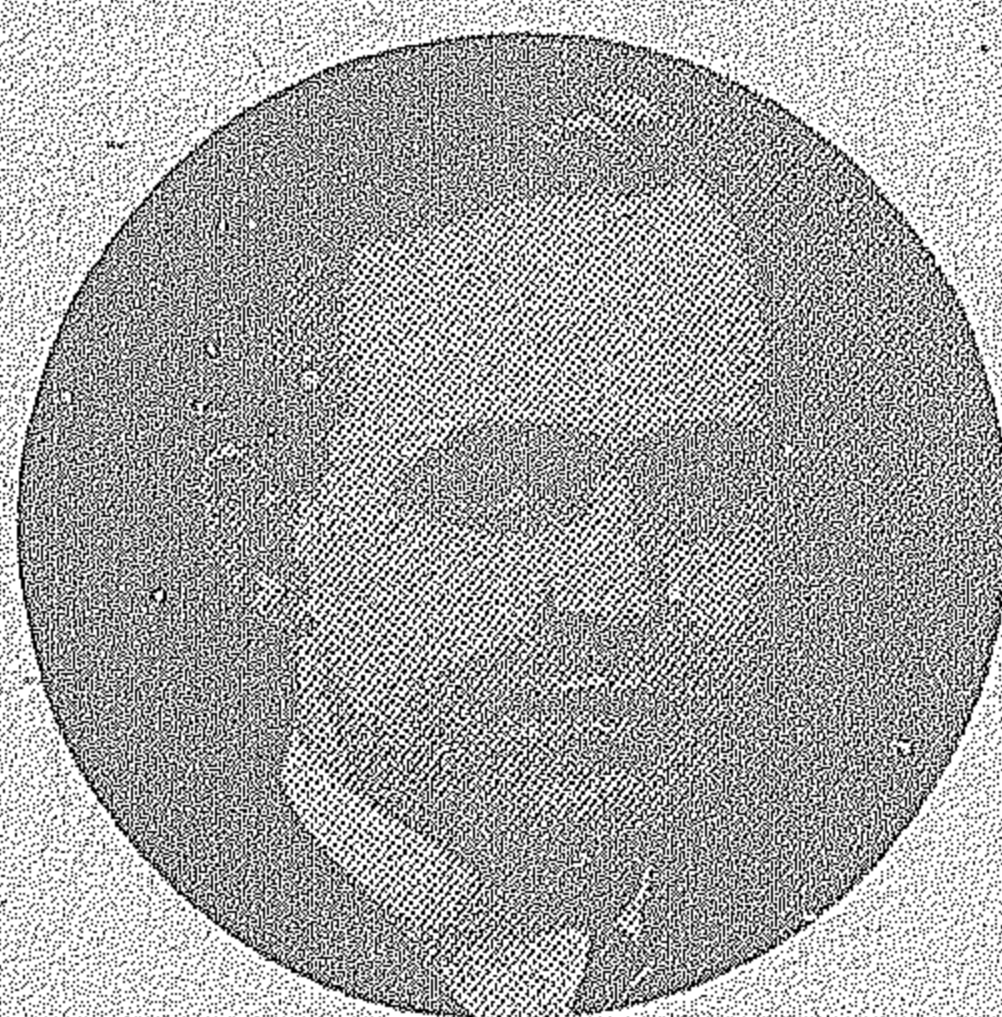
The evening school was the first to make the move toward the peace time schedule. With the low enrollment at Lewis, many students find it necessary to take evening courses to fill out their programs.

E. S. Pettyjohn New IGT Head Will Take Up Duties on Naval Mission Release

Comdr. Elmer Shaw Pettyjohn, U.S.N.R., was today named director of the Institute of Gas Technology at Illinois Institute of Technology, succeeding John I. Yellott who has held the post since September 1, 1943.

Until the time when Comdr. Pettyjohn's naval assignment is terminated, Associate Director I. J. Willien will be in charge, according to the announcement by Henry T. Heald, president of Illinois Tech and the Institute of Gas Technology.

Comdr. Pettyjohn is at present absent from the country as head of the oil section of the United States Strategic Bombing Survey and as liaison officer in the United States Naval Technical Mission. Extensive experience as a consultant to numerous gas companies has fitted him for the directorship of the Gas Institute.

Mr. Yellott will leave the Gas Institute on May 1 to become director of research with the Locomotive Development Committee of Baltimore, Md. A mechanical engineering graduate of John Hopkins University, Yellott served as director of the department of mechanical engineering at Illinois Tech for three years before taking the directorship of the Institute of Gas Technology. While at Illinois Tech he also directed the Engineering Science and Management War Training program.

In 1939 Yellott was named the "Outstanding Mechanical Engineer of the Past Decade" by Pi Tau Sigma. He was presented the Distinguished Service Award by the Chicago Junior Chamber of Commerce in 1942 and in that same year was named Outstanding Young Man of Illinois and received the Illinois Civic Service Award from the Illinois Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Graduation to Be on June 23

Formal commencement of the June, 1945 class will be held Saturday, June 23 at 8 p.m. according to Dean Tibbals. Exercises are to take place in the Museum of Science and Industry, which is located within Jackson Park at the east end of Fifty-seventh street.

President Henry T. Heald is now in the process of securing a commencement speaker.
