

Techawk Baseball Squad Defeated by Concordia 8 to 7

Murphy and O'Geary Leading Hitters for IIT; Stroh of Concordia Fans 16 Tech Batters

Although outhitting their opponents by almost 2 to 1, the baseball team suffered its first defeat of the season by being nosed out by Concordia 8 to 7 at Ogden Field last Saturday.

After a wild first three innings, marked by Tech's 5 errors, Concordia managed to combine a total of 8 runs on 6 hits. Thereafter no runs were scored as A/S Gene Evers allowed but 2 hits in the remaining 6 innings of play.

Shut out for the first three innings of play, Tech staged a brilliant rally and managed to push across 2 runs in the 4th on three hits and 2 runs in the 5th. A/S Bill Crowley performed flawlessly afield and was credited with one of the runs batted in by singling A/S Dennis O'Geary home in the 5th inning.

In the seventh inning 3 runs were scored on 3 safe blows by Murphy, Krawczak, a sacrifice by Crowley, and a hit by Maciejewski to bring the total of 7 runs. From this point on, neither team was able to score and the final result was Concordia, 8; Illinois Tech, 7.

Leading hitters for the afternoon were A/S Ray Murphy, with 4 hits in 5 trips to the plate and A/S Dennis O'Geary, who connected for 3 safe hits in the same number of attempts.

A/S Gene Evers struck out 8 batters and allowed 5 base on balls while Stroh of Concordia fanned 16 Tech batters and walked 3 men.

Last week, a team meeting was held and A/S Gene Evers and A/S Ray Murphy were unanimously elected co-captains for the season by their team mates.

He placed first in the high jump event, clearing the bar at 5 feet 4 inches; ran second in the 100 yard dash and came in third in the 220 yard dash. He was anchor man on the winning 880 yard relay team consisting of Thomas, A/S Ned Grable, A/S Jack Hammack, and the time for this event was 1:33.7.

Arx Trip Sophs In IM Tourney

In one of the most hotly contested battles seen on the campus for some time, the Soph Bums staged a last minute rally to gain a 4 to 4 deadlock with the Senior Civils. A/S Jack Hammack, formerly Southern Conference Champion in the 440 yard run, won this event in :51.8 which was also his indoor time in the triangular meet with Lawrence College and Morton Junior College two weeks ago.

The broad jump event was captured by A/S Dick Papps with a mighty leap of 20 feet 11 1/2 inches. A thriller from start to finish, co-captain A/S Bob Thurston ran second to Bill Tully in the 880 yard run.

The Notre Dame cause was immensely aided by ten first places. Six of these firsts were accounted for by three double winners—Joe Kelly who placed first in both the shot put and discus events, Bill Tully in the half mile and mile runs, and Dave Murphy who scored in the 100 and 200 yard dashes.

The meet was marked by extreme competition in each event and the 220 yard low hurdles event was the only one in which one team placed three men.

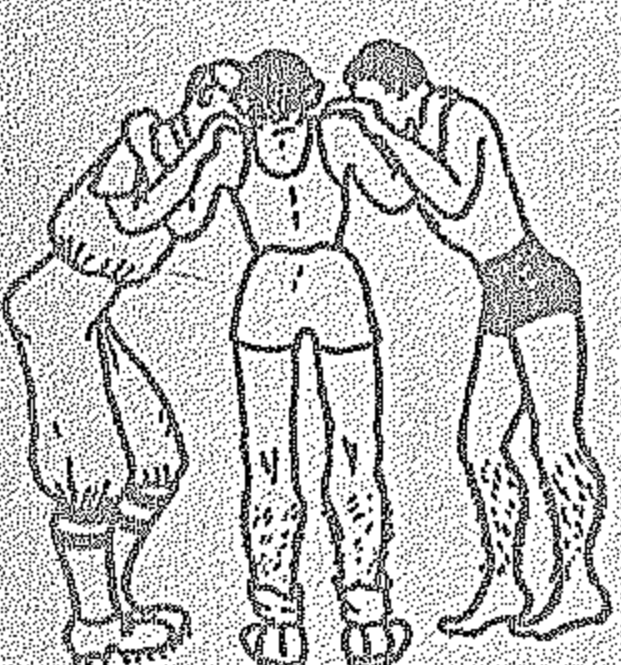

The only alternative would be the formation of a group of tennis enthusiasts, who could and would devote a few hours a week in fixing up the courts. This would be a vast improvement and would be greatly appreciated by the student body.

As part of the post-war ex-

penditure of thirteen million dollars recently announced by President Heald, included is \$450,000.00 for a gymnasium and \$650,000.00 for a field house. These additions would bring IIT sports to a higher level than ever before. Lack of a field house and gymnasium greatly hampers outdoor sports as practice in early spring is limited to the "cheese box". Time was when the armory was available for practice sessions but it is doubtful as to when the army will return it to its pre-war standing.

The intramural softball tournament should come to an abrupt end but fast, if the teams continue to forfeit as they did last week. There were numerous excuses for failure to show up such as bad weather, classes, etc. This week will find these same teams competing after 5:00 p.m. and failure to show up will result in forfeit.

Another thing which has come to my attention is that a few fellows are playing on more than one team in the tourney. As soon as possible, team entries will get a good going over and violators will be declared ineligible by the intramural manager and thus barred from playing on any team in the meet.
