THE PRELIMINARY elections of the ITSA and school classes may be over, but the results as announced in the box on this page are only the beginning of more far-reaching events. That these events are in many cases in the hands of men who have chosen to accept them, and done so unprotested by any members of the school, is not good.

Of the five junior class officers, four were uncontested. These four men may be the ones for the job. Yet the fact remains that their empty victory makes them uncertain of class support. A protest in the form of an opponent, no matter how good or bad, brings about a choice the class must make and indicates their backing the winner.

The sophomore and freshmen elections were not held, but postponed to a class meeting this Tuesday. Although some of the offices were applied for with single petitions, A/S Robert Freund, then vice-president of the ITSA, said the elections could not be held. Still, his own uncontested petition for president of the ITSA, probably the most important student office in the school, was allowed to go to the student body for a mock vote.

Such selfish inconsistency is typical of the Robert Freund method as he demonstrated numerous times at ITSA meetings last semester. His election as president carries with it only one redeeming feature—Roberts' Rules of Order prohibit his opinion without surrender of the gavel, and his vote except in case of a tie.

New 1945 Integral Will Be Distributed Tuesday Afternoon

The new IIT Integral will be issued Tuesday, from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. in the Student Union lounge, according to Ed Rubin, Integral business manager.

V-12 men who have subscribed to the Integral must bring their receipts to get their copies. Others may purchase the Integral for the full price of \$3.00. Graduates may pick up their books in person or send in a written request. Lewis students can pick up their books at Armour or send in a written request to the business manager. Their copies will be held until they can do so.

Those eligible to receive the Integral free are full time civilian students who attended IIT from November, 1944 through June, 1945. Civilian students who have attended IIT for one semester may obtain the Integral by paying \$1.50. Incoming freshman can get copies by paying the full price.

21 Positions Filled in Election

West Campus Will Shift to Armour in Fall

All Arts and Sciences Courses To Be Housed In Humanities Building

The transfer of all arts and science work from the west campus to the south campus before September 1, 1945, was announced today by President Henry T. Heald. This is in line with IIT's expansion and consolidation on the south campus.

Courses formerly taken at Lewis will be housed in the new \$350,000 Humanities Building, for which priorities have already been applied. It will be constructed in the near future on 33rd street and will extend from State to Dearborn streets.

Notice of the transfer came as construction started on Illinois Tech's \$10,000,000 south side campus development. Work was started last week on the new Naval Science Building at 32nd and State streets. The Engineering Research Building also has an addition which was started at that time.

The complete new south side campus will extend from 31st to 35th streets along Michigan avenue and west to the New York Central railroad tracks. On this development it is planned to house all present divisions of the Institute. The limits of the present campus will run from 32nd to 35th streets with the completion of the Naval Science Building and the Engineering Research extension.

IIT, formed in June, 1940, by the merging of Armour Institute of Technology and Lewis Institute, has offered work on the former campuses of both institutions since the consolidation. Engineering work had been largely concentrated on the south campus, and arts and sciences were studied on the west campus.

The move announced today means that by September 1 of this year, the college of engineering, institute

Wilhelm Leaves Unit; Martus, Florence and Baldwin Arrive

Three new officers have been added to the IIT Navy Unit and one has been transferred.

Lt. Samuel A. Wilhelm, former athletic officer, was transferred to the Armed Guard last Saturday. He has been attached to the unit since the latter part of 1944.

Taking the position of Battalion Officer and Assistant Professor of Naval Science will be Lt. George Florence, who was transferred here from the NROTC Unit at Rice Institute in Texas.

Lt. Florence, whose home is in Athens, Ga., is a graduate of the University of Georgia where he was captain of the basketball team and named All-Southern in 1927. He has done graduate work at Duke University.

After joining the navy in September, 1942, Lt. Florence had a varied tour of duty. He has trained at Princeton University, Navy Armed Guard, Fire Fighters, and Damage Control schools. He taught mathematics for 13 years at Georgia Military College.

Lt. Theodore Martus, the new athletic officer, served for 22 months

Browning Ties Olson For Head Of Senior Class Contest To Be Runoff Friday; Freshmen and Sophomores to Meet

Navy students won nineteen out of twenty-one of the offices in the all-school election last Friday.

The office of president of the ITSA was won by A/S Robert Freund. No one contested his try for office. Winning the vice-presidency was A/S Joe Hardman, who defeated Dewitt Pickens. A/S Charles Hatstat beat A/S Jim Brophy for the position of ITSA secretary. Freund, formerly vice-president, is the only returning officer of the ITSA. This victory is his second uncontested chance at office.

The senior class presidency was so closely fought between A/S Robert Browning and A/S Ramon Olson, that a runoff will be held next Friday between 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. in the Student Union lobby. A/S Don Helbling beat A/S Tom Blim for the vice-president's office.

Vice-president of the ITSA from the senior class was won by A/S Herb Corten, who beat A/S William Wilt in a hard won race. The senior offices of secretary, treasurer, social chairman and SUBC representative were won by A/S Edward Forhan, A/S Richard Miller, A/S Harry A. Knowlton, and Arnold Borenstein respectively.

Four out of five offices in the junior class were uncontested. They were: president, A/S Witold Kosicki; vice-president, A/S Lloyd Giegel; social chairman, A/S John P. Makielski; and SUBC representative, A/S Lawrence Byrnes. A/S Rudolph Foglia won the treasurer's job by defeating A/S David G. Hoffman.

The freshman and sophomore class elections will be held on Friday, July 19. Freshmen will gather in 305 Main, while sophomores will meet in 502 Main. Nominations will be made for both classes either by petition or from the floor in their respective rooms.



Break Ground For New Navy Building, Ready in November

Several hundred members of the student body and faculty at Illinois Institute of Technology gathered last Friday to watch a young apprentice seaman enrolled in the Navy V-12 program break ground for the \$300,000 Naval Science Building.

Marking the first actual step since the recent announcement of a \$10,000,000 campus development program at Illinois Tech, the building will house a Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps on its completion about February 1 of next year. The NROTC unit, which will be established on November 1, 1945, will use existing facilities until that time.

Led by the Navy V-12 band, the entire navy unit marched in a group from Main Building to the site of the Naval Science Building between State and Dearborn on 32nd street after 11 o'clock.

Dr. Henry T. Heald, president of the Institute, and Lt. Royal F. Sessions, commanding officer of the V-12 unit, spoke briefly to open the

IIT Shuts Out Inspectors 12-0

Murphy's Homer Puts V-12'ers Ahead Early

Illinois Tech's V-12'ers strengthened their grip on first place in the Navy softball league Wednesday when they walloped the Inspectors of Naval Material 12 to 0 at Grant Park.

Ray Murphy turned in a fine exhibition of softball pitching, striking out 12 men. Backed by a team which collected 13 hits against 1 for the Inspectors, it was IIT all the way.

Bob Hauser led off the batting order, getting a single on an error by the first baseman, Hornaday. Then Ray Murphy slapped out a home run, scoring the first two runs of the game. Mieskowski, third man up, was walked, and brought home by sacrifice hits by Schimmelpfenig, McAdam, and Ferguson.

High inning of the game was the second when the entire team batted around and picked up six runs. With two men on and two down, Mieskowski came up with a triple that scored two and put him in scoring position. Schimmelpfenig followed through by getting on by an error in short center, and McAdam drove him in with a single. McAdam died on first when Ferguson flied out.

On the Inspector's side of the score sheet, their lone hit came in the fourth inning when Clock banged out a single. Murphy put down the next three as they came, and the Inspector's only scoring chance failed.




Tech Softballers Play for Title

(Continued from Page 1) program. Dr. Heald announced that he hoped to see work begin "very soon" on two other new structures—a \$350,000 Humanities Building and a \$600,000 Metallurgy and Chemical Engineering Building.

The first actual ground was removed by A/S Warren S. Witus, of Detroit, Michigan, a first semester freshman in the navy program who, from point of academic standing, is the youngest member of the unit.

It will contain 10 classrooms for teaching of navy classes, an ordnance laboratory and armory, eight suites of offices, three storage rooms, and a full regulation rifle range in the basement.

The Dahl-Stedman Company, 11 South LaSalle Street, is the contractor. Ludwig Mies van der Rohe, professor of architecture at Illinois Tech and director of the Institute's architectural curriculum, has designed the building.

CPM Joseph Gay is Veteran of Six Years of Varied Navy Life

From duty aboard an army transport manned by the Coast Guard and staffed by navy pharmacist mates to IIT's navy V-12 unit, that's only a small part of the varied naval career of Chief Pharmacist Mate Joseph Gay, recently attached to the unit.

Gay, whose home town is Jennings, Florida, has seen six years of navy life, and has had terms of duty of many different types, including 21 months overseas.

Stationed at the naval dispensary in Washington, D.C., he helped administer to diplomats and relatives of congressmen and their families. "This was very exacting work," says Gay, grinning.

After an assignment at the medical supply depot in Brooklyn filling fleet prescriptions, he sailed on a merchant ship that was part of a hospital contingent to Guadalcanal and began 21 months of overseas duty.

After 15 months on Guadalcanal, interspersed with time aboard a Dutch ship, Gay was sent to Auckland, New Zealand, via New Caledonia. At a fleet hospital there he received his chief's rating.

Following this he served on the USS General Randall, the ship with the versatile crew mentioned before. "With an army transport, manned by the Coast Guard, staffed with navy P-Mates, we were about the smallest 'combined operations' afloat," laughed Gay.

"And now I'm with a navy V-12 unit; from what I've seen so far this will be about the best break I've had since I joined the navy."

Which is saying quite a bit.

With only the remnants of what once was the powerful third deck remaining, the newcomers will have a tough time living up to the old reputation.



Miller Named ARF Chairman

The appointment of K. W. Miller, former director of research of the Utilities Research Commission, as chairman of electrical engineering research at the Armour Research Foundation of Illinois Institute of Technology was announced today by Dr. Jesse E. Hobson, director of the Foundation.

A graduate of the University of Illinois in 1919, Mr. Miller received his master of science degree in electrical engineering from Union College, Schenectady, New York, in 1931.

Prior to his appointment as research director of the Utilities Research Commission in 1931, Mr. Miller was employed consecutively by the marine engineering department of General Electric Corporation in Schenectady, the City of Seattle Skagit River Hydro-Electric Project, and the Commonwealth Edison Company of Chicago. In this latter position, he became well known for his work with oil filled cables and in the field of reduction of sheath losses on single conductor underground power cables.

New Head Librarian Comes to Institute

William Humphrey Hyde, Jr., head librarian of the Illinois Institute of Technology, arrived here recently to assume his duties. Hyde came from Ithaca, New York.

Born in Cleveland, Ohio, Hyde received a B.A. degree at Oberlin College in 1925, his majors being history and economics. Until his appointment as librarian at IIT, Hyde was librarian of the College of Engineering at Cornell University. As an assistant to the university library board, Hyde conducted a survey of library conditions and reorganized and developed the engineering college libraries.

Hyde is a member of the Society for the Promotion of Engineering Education, the American Library Association, the Special Libraries Association and the New York Library Club.

Among the activities of the new librarian are golf and bridge. He is looking forward to the future development of the IIT libraries when the new campus is a reality.
