

CPM Joseph Gay is Veteran of Six Years of Varied Navy Life

From duty aboard an army transport manned by the Coast Guard and staffed by navy pharmacist mates to IIT's navy V-12 unit, that's only a small part of the varied naval career of Chief Pharmacist Mate Joseph Gay, recently attached to the unit.

Gay, whose home town is Jennings, Florida, has seen six years of duty of many different types, including 21 months overseas.

Stationed at the naval dispensary in Washington, D.C., he helped administer to diplomats and relatives of congressmen and their families. "This was very exacting work," says Gay, grinning.

After an assignment at the medical supply depot in Brooklyn filling fleet prescriptions, he sailed on a merchant ship that was part of a hospital contingent to Guadalcanal and began 21 months of overseas duty.

After 15 months on Guadalcanal, interspersed with time aboard a Dutch ship, Gay was sent to Auckland, New Zealand, via New Caledonia. At a fleet hospital there he received his chief's rating.

Following this he served on the USS General Randall, the ship with the versatile crew mentioned before. "With an army transport, manned by the Coast Guard, staffed with navy P-Mates, we were about the smallest 'combined operations' afloat," laughed Gay.

"And now I'm with a navy V-12 unit; from what I've seen so far this will be about the best break I've had since I joined the navy."

Which is saying quite a bit.

Hendricks and Supple Leave To Teach at GI Universities

Two professors from Illinois Institute of Technology are taking a leave of absence with the beginning of the new term on July 5 and sailing immediately to instruct in the GI universities now being set up in Europe.

Dr. Walter Hendricks, professor of English and chairman of the department of language and literature, goes to the American university in France, where he will instruct army personnel in English.

His colleague, Lee Francis Supple, professor of organic chemistry, will be at the university in England on the staff of the chemistry department. Supple will continue with the army work until September, 1946, while Dr. Hendricks will return to the Illinois Tech staff in February of the same year.

Also on the European trek is Harry E. Heisler, who served as financial administrative assistant of Illinois Tech's ESMWT courses. He will set up non-college trade courses in the field of accountancy for GI's in France. Purpose of the two universities which the U.S. government is setting up abroad is to give men still stationed in Europe a chance to take refresher courses and gain college credit before their return home.

Miller Named ARF Chairman

The appointment of K. W. Miller, former director of research of the Utilities Research Commission, as chairman of electrical engineering research at the Armour Research Foundation of Illinois Institute of Technology was announced today by Dr. Jesse E. Hobson, director of the Foundation.

A graduate of the University of Illinois in 1919, Mr. Miller received his master of science degree in electrical engineering from Union College, Schenectady, New York, in 1931.

Prior to his appointment as research director of the Utilities Research Commission in 1931, Mr. Miller was employed consecutively by the marine engineering department of General Electric Corporation in Schenectady, the City of Seattle Skagit River Hydro-Electric Project, and the Commonwealth Edison Company of Chicago. In this latter position, he became well known for his work with oil filled cables and in the field of reduction of sheath losses on single conductor underground power cables.

New Head Librarian Comes to Institute

William Humphrey Hyde, Jr., head librarian of the Illinois Institute of Technology, arrived here recently to assume his duties. Hyde came from Ithaca, New York.

Born in Cleveland, Ohio, Hyde received a B.A. degree at Oberlin College in 1925, his majors being history and economics. He attended Columbia University, where he received a B.S. degree in library science in 1929. After some years of library work at Columbia University, the New York Public Library, and the University Club, Hyde received an M.S. degree in library science in 1938 from Columbia University.

Until his appointment as librarian at IIT, Hyde was librarian of the College of Engineering at Cornell University. As an assistant to the university library board, Hyde conducted a survey of library conditions and reorganized and developed the engineering college libraries.

Hyde is a member of the Society for the Promotion of Engineering Education, the American Library Association, the Special Libraries Association and the New York Library Club.

Among the activities of the new librarian are golf and bridge. He is looking forward to the future development of the IIT libraries when the new campus is a reality.
