## IIT To Acquire Campus in Loop For Next Term

### Home Economics and Architecture Courses Will Be Taught There

Illinois Tech is to have a downtown center at 18 South Michigan Avenue. The center, consisting of the eighth and eleventh floors, will be opened as soon as possible after contracts for its acquisition are signed.

The portion of the building to be occupied by Illinois Tech formerly housed the University College of the University of Chicago.

Greater service to the community keynotes the new location and, as President Heald pointed out, the centralization of certain day and evening classes will help students who have but a few classes. Departments to be housed entirely in the downtown campus include the Institute's department of architecture, which has been located at the Art Institute for over 50 years, and the department of home economics, which is to be transferred from the closed west campus.

Evening classes in other departments will also be held in the Michigan Avenue building. Classes are scheduled to start at the beginning of next term, with enrollment for evening classes to be on September 25. Enrollment for day classes is to be held October 30 and 31 at Technology Center, class meetings beginning November 1.

Evening curricula will include courses in industrial engineering and management, home economics, languages and literature, metallurgy and plastics, mechanics, and psychology at the undergraduate level; and graduate courses in electrical engineering, chemistry, industrial engineering, and political and social science.

## Nuns Are Here for Research In Physics

Many students were surprised to see nuns working in the physics building. Sister Miriam Michael Stimson, assistant professor of chemistry and head of the research laboratory and Sister Mary Aginta Reuter, head of the department of natural sciences, both at Siena Heights College, have come to IIT to do research until the end of August.

Sister Stimson intends to engage in research in the application of ultraviolet absorption spectroscopy to the identification of organic structure, and the application of fluorescence and chromatography to the purification of organic compounds. Sister Reuter has come to IIT to study ultraviolet absorption, purine and pyrimidine fluorescence, intercellular wound hormones, and the effect of hydroxyl substitutions on ultraviolet absorption. Both intend to do work on Raman spectra of some of the hydro-carbons, and on the calibrations of the infra-red spectrograph.

## Corten Made President Of IFC; Sports Planned

The Interfraternity Council recently held its elections for the present term. The officers elected were: president, Herb Corten, and secretary-treasurer, Gedaliah Katz. This year's activities include a large sports program, featuring ping-pong, tennis, baseball, and swimming.

## Charles Leigh Dies; Taught Mechanics at IIT Five Decades

Mr. Charles W. Leigh, formerly professor of analytic mechanics, passed away on June 30, 1945.

He graduated from the University of Illinois in 1897 and went to Fort Worth University as professor of mathematics. In 1900 he came to Armour to teach mathematics and mechanics. When the department of mechanics was organized, he became a professor of mechanics and remained until eight years ago, when he had to retire because of failing health.

In Professor Leigh the students found the ideal teacher. He had a knack for presenting his material in an amazing manner which made a real impression on his students so that they assimilated his subjects.

He was a co-author of *Plane & Spherical Trigonometry* by Palmer and Leigh, also of *Practical Mechanics* and *Strength of Materials* by Leigh and Mangold.

For fifteen years he served as choir director of the Englewood M. E. Church. Our former students will most keenly remember him as director of the Armour Glee Club and Orchestra. He enjoyed a game of golf and served as faculty sponsor of the Armour Golf Team.

He combined in a unique way both musical and mathematical abilities and used both for the pleasure and the training of his students. He was a member of Tau Beta Pi, as well as other social and professional groups.

Professor Leigh enjoyed his teaching and kept ever in mind the twofold purpose of education, which consists of the imparting of specialized information, as well as the development of character and the enlargement of the students' view of life.

## New Quota Set For Navy Unit

The quota for the navy unit at IIT will be increased to 404 men next term, announced Dr. Henry T. Heald today. This represents an increase of more than 100 over the present term.

As there are to be 52 Navy graduates in November, 151 men will come into the unit at this time. All of these men are to come from the fleet and will be NROTC students. It is expected that no new V-12 trainees will be stationed here in November.

Another quarters will be added to the six houses already occupied by navy men. The Institute is readying the house at 3220 S. Michigan Avenue, next to Quarters 7. The building will be completely remodeled before the men move in.

Several types of naval ordnance are to be shipped to the IIT navy unit in November as show pieces. These pieces will be housed in the NROTC building now under construction.

The new commanding officer due to arrive in November will have a rank of captain, Lt. R. F. Sessions, present commanding officer, said.

## Dance Club Records Feminine Members

Registration of all feminine members of Dance Club will begin at this week's meeting. The move is partially prompted by the need for new faces in the Link files and partially by the need for contacting the girls in case of unexpected developments in the running of the club.
