

Record Looms For Navy Team

Murphy's Hurling Plus Offense Vanquish Foes

The navy V-12 softball team is approaching the end of a successful season in the Chicago Area Navy Softball League.

Organized last spring to provide recreation and sport for the various naval stations in and around Chicago, the CANL received applications from all stations and set up a schedule. Illinois Tech's V-12 unit was quick to build a team, and with Sp(A)1/c Cecil Richards as coach, they took all comers.

The season started for IIT on May 30 when they met Gardiner Hospital at Grant Park and turned them back 6 to 2, behind Ray Murphy's ten strikeout pitching. The University of Chicago gave the squad their first setup for a shut-out. Murphy pitched this one also and filled the U. of C. side of the scoreboard with K's as he struck out 12 batters. IIT collected 13 runs in that one, with Maidl, the opposing pitcher, giving away five walks before being relieved in the fifth by Beatty. Beatty did no better, for he walked six in his one inning stretch.

The Chicago Shore Patrol was on the short end of Murphy's second shutout, 7 to 0, in the third game of the series. IIT put across 3 runs in the first frame and 4 in the second before Burdiss of the S.P.'s clamped down and cut off further scoring threats.

An outside game was played July 10 with Armour Research at Ogden Field. In this one the navy team had Murphy and Paul Martin on the mound in setting the ARF down 7 to 2.

Bud Kleeman and Ray Murphy starred in the contest with the Inspectors of Naval Material on July 11 at Grant Park. Each clouted a homer, Murphy in the first and Kleeman in the fourth. The Inspector's side of the score sheet was filled with 12 strikeouts and no more than four men were up in an inning.

IIT's lone defeat was at the hands of the Aurora ten who walked away winners by a score of 4 to 0. Woodrich, who hurled for them, managed to strike out nine V-12ers and allowed only 2 hits. Errors were the deciding factor and Tech made five.

The team that made five errors in that game roared back for revenge when it played the Naval Armory on August 22. Clocking up 14 runs and 12 hits against the Armory's 0 runs and 2 hits. Tech showed power as the squad shut out the opponents with one hit in the second and third innings. There were no errors in that ball game.

Professor Dutton has also recently been reappointed chairman of the management division of the Chicago chapter of the ASME.


IM Playoffs Start Today

Techawks Take Third Straight League Win; Each Team Connects for Three Hits

Another win was recorded for the V-12 softball team in a game played on the Tech campus last Monday. The Techawks came through with 2 runs and Special Devices had a goose-egg in the scoring column. One of the oddities of the game was the fact that the first three Tech batters were out on ground balls to the Special Devices second baseman.

Ray Murphy pitched 3 hit ball and struck out 9 batters in the game. In the fourth inning Special Devices looked like they might push a run across the plate. The first batter doubled to left center. Alberts popped up to Dave Hoffman and Poitier flied out to the short center, Roy Schimelpfenig. Murphy ended the threat by striking out Maidl.

Dean H. P. Dutton, head of the industrial engineering department at IIT, attended a meeting of the Education Board of the national Society for the Advancement of Management August 28. At this meeting, plans were set up for the social activities to be held by the SAM for the next season.

The first meeting will be a regional conference held at the Drake hotel in October. At this conference, the Benge award will be made. This award is annually presented to the person who is selected as contributing the most outstanding work to the industrial engineering profession in the past year.

Other meetings will include discussions on job evaluation, performance rating, cost and wage incentive plans, and other industrial engineering subjects.

Physical Chemist Gives Lecture for Engineers

Mr. J. R. Baylis, physical chemist of the Department of Water Works, gave a lecture for the ASCE at their meeting recently.

His topic was the new filtration plant located at Seventy-ninth street and the lake. Aided by slides to illustrate the construction work and the expected operation of the plant, he stated, "At the present time, it is partly complete with only the chlorination section in operation. Even so, it provides an average of 329 million gallons of water for the million and a half people on the south side. The filtering section of the plant is expected to be completed at this time next year. The total capacity will then be 800 million gallons. This gigantic filtering plant will be one of the largest in the world when finished.
