

Techmen Take Three Straight On Clay Courts; Loyola Next

George Williams, Concordia, Loyola Fail to Hermann's Netmen in Two Weeks of Play

With three straight wins to their credit, the netmen opened another full week of match play yesterday afternoon with a dual meet against Beloit College at Armour Square. Thursday the Techawks tangle with Loyola and Saturday play host to the Broncos of Western Michigan at Armour Square, starting at 2 p.m.

In their three recent wins, the tennis squad racked up 20 matches against George Williams, Concordia, and Loyola, while losing only one match, a three set singles battle between Bob Hall and Ralph Greene of GW, former Iowa state champion.

Loyola's Ramblers merely crawled against Tech in their match two weeks ago, salvaging only 21 games in 14 sets and losing 7 to 0. They should prove no tougher in Thursday's encounter.

Western Michigan, however, which is paced by Walter Stuckert of Milwaukee, is reputed to have a powerhouse, this season. Illinois Tech was rained out in a scheduled appearance there on May 4, which combined with a broken axle, a traffic ticket, an empty gas tank, and a defeat at the hands of Kalamazoo College to make it a memorable day.

The Broncos will play their third match in three days against Tech Saturday, as they are scheduled to play Purdue at Lafayette, Indiana, Thursday, and Northwestern at Evanston on Friday.

Following this encounter, the Techmen will face Marquette in a home-and-series, and Concordia in a return match at River Forest to wind up their 1946 schedule.

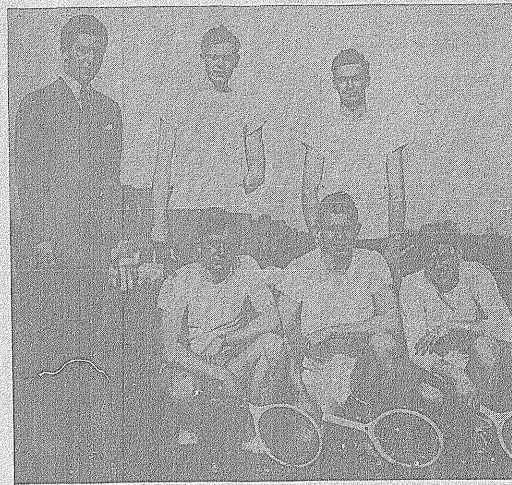
Airdales Top Company Three in Navy Softball

The basketball team got revenge in the last two weeks—in a peculiar form, but revenge. Three schools were responsible for four of the losses suffered by them two narrow margin defeats and George Williams and Concordia squeezed by with a win apiece by a basket or two. The tennis squad, a minor athletic team under the present rulings, took on these outfits, one after another, and set them back on their heels, by completely one-sided scores. Carl Bergstrom, lanky center on the cage squad, took particular delight in putting down Loyola's Capparos 6-0, 6-0 in the latest clash. His smashing strokes defeated Bayer of Concordia in two sets, 6-0, 6-2, and he rolled over Harper of the G. Williams, 6-2, 6-3.

Sonny Weissman revamped his entire lineup for the clash with Naval Army here two weeks ago. Jim Sullivan, usually filling in at second, was moved to right field; Captain Fran Krawczak was shifted from short to third; Bob Bushelle, benched so far because of illness early in the season, started at second; Jim Railing, southpaw hurler, moved in-

vaged a point in the 880 yard run by running fifth. Malis of Tech added another point in the ledger when he tied down the number five spot in the 220 yard dash.

Galbreath of Tech tied for fourth place along with three others to add 1/2 of a point to the squads' total in the pole vault. Smith grabbed a fourth in the shot put event for two points while Tech's relay squad ran third behind Wheaton and Western Michigan to give the Techmen their final three points.

Two meet records fell during competition and several were threatened on the suburban track. Taylor of Western Michigan bettered the old mark in the 120 yard high hurdles set by Starrett of Loyola in 1934, by 1/2 of a second, churning the oval in 14.8 seconds. He also snapped the high jump mark of 6'3 1/2" set by Beechel of Chicago Normal in 1935, when he cleared 6'4 1/2".

Tech Nine Snaps 3 Game Losing Streak Against Concordia

"Sonny" Weissman's baseball squad snapped its losing streak at three straight last Tuesday when it came from behind in the seventh and eighth innings of a nine-inning contest with Concordia Teachers to triumph, 7-3. Ken Adams went the route for the Techawks, limiting the Teachers to five scattered hits while collecting three singles himself.

Tech looked like it was offering its opponents another win on a silver platter in the second inning when three consecutive errors and a single gave Concordia a 2-0 lead. Three hits a hit batter, and another error, gave the Teachers another tally in the fifth.

The seventh stanza saw the break-up of the Concordia outfit as the Tech batsmen got on the range and blasted five singles, combined with two walks to drive five tallies across the plate. Dick McKee, who clouted a .500 for the day, started it with a single, but was thrown out at second on a fielder's choice that put Padula on first. Swanson hit safely and Ken Adams got his second hit of the game to drive Padula home. Vallerky, the Teachers' hurler, was up to his neck in trouble by that time, and when he gave up two walks and a base blow, he was relieved. Schwick was pulled out at short and he shouldered the mound chores with three on and two out. Jim Krebs was credited with two runs batted in when he drove one deep in right center to score Fran Krawczak, and Jim Knowlton. McKee, up for the second time that inning, rolled one down to the mound and was thrown out at first to end the stanza.

Two errors, two singles, and a stroll combined to give the Techawks two more runs in the eighth before Schwick bore down and marked up a K for Railing and Krebs.

The ninth ended with a Teachers on first and third when Adams picked up a dribble down to the mound and made the throw to first in time.

Naval Armoxy 12, IIT 8

Dropping an eight run lead in the third inning, the Techmen lost to an outfit Naval Armoxy squad last week on Ogdan Field. Ken Adams was the losing pitcher. The Techmen chalked up an unimpressive total of six errors, five of them in the last four innings, to aid the Naval Armoxy cause considerably.

In his three stanzas, Adam yielded six base blows which combined with four Tech misplays to send in ten tallies. It was the first time Weissman tried his revised lineup, with a complete shift of the infield. The next week the team was back at its original setup.
