

Pi Kappa Phi, Wrong Guys Win Campus Softball Titles

Triangle Nosed Out in Tight Cup Race 7-3; Wrong Guys Defeat Senior Mechs 11-10

Charles Futterer's triple and Bill Armstrong's single with one out in the last half of the seventh inning netted the Weissman's Wrong Guys an 11-10 victory over the Senior Mechs in the championship tilt in the annual intramural tournament.

Lorie Schmidt went the route for the Wrong Guys, allowing 15 hits.

Spotty defensive play plus timely hitting by both crews kept the game a nip and tuck affair. The Senior Mechs came from behind twice to knot the count only to be denied in the final stanza. "Howie" Johnson and Jake Shore split the hurling duties for the Mechs, allowing the Wrong Guys 11 hits.

Earlier in the day, the Senior Mechs downed the strong Junior Perennials by a 16-15 score in a semi-final game. Bill MacDonough of the Perennials as well as Jake Shore of the Mechs could not silence the bats of their opponents as evidenced by the liberal scores compiled by both squads. The Perennials had previously downed the Soph All Stars 9-2, to qualify for the semi-final pairings.

As a feature of Junior Week the newly crowned intramural champions were matched with an Alumni squad made up of the Senior Mechs of 1942. The Wrong Guys overcame a 3-0 deficit early in the game and were never headed after that, emerging with a 9-7 win. Thompson enjoyed a perfect day at bat for the Wrong Guy's getting four hits out of four trips to the plate while Mangini connected for three safeties out of four chances.

Pi Kapp Phi won the Interfrat Softball championship by virtue of two victories over Triangle during Junior Week.

The first game was a bitterly contested affair with the Pi Kaps outlasting Triangle to win 6 to 5 in eleven innings. The Pi Kapps played heads up ball all the way making the most of their six hits and three Triangle miscues. Each team scored one in the first but the Pi Kapps forged ahead with two in the second while Triangle got but one. Triangle then rallied to score three on hits by Lund, Kuehn, and Melek but suffered a severe loss when Lund broke his knee cap sliding into home. Lund remained in the game however until the eighth inning when fearing that he wouldn't be able to run out a hit he withdrew for a pinch-hitter.

The Pi Kapps sent the game into extra innings by pushing across two

runs in the sixth on four successive hits by Mickiewicz, Eberhardt, Piekons and Gloodt. Both sides then played airtight ball until the first of the eleventh when Brophy got the first hit since the sixth inning. He advanced to second on Montblanc's fly and scored when Eberhardt singled sharply to left. Piekons then fled out to retire the side. Triangle failed to score in its half and the ball game was over.

The Pi Kapps won the second game 7 to 3 with a four run spurge in the fifth, and put the game on ice with a run in the sixth. Triangle scored two runs in the first and one in the third. Dini hit a homer for the losers with no one on.

Tech Places Fourth In '46 Beloit Relays

The Illinois Tech thimbleads placed fourth in the seventh annual Beloit Relays, Saturday, May 25, at Strong Stadium, Beloit, Wisconsin against a field of sixteen teams. Lawrence College topped Wheaton College by a fraction, 60 to 59½, to win the meet, with Iowa State Teachers in third place.

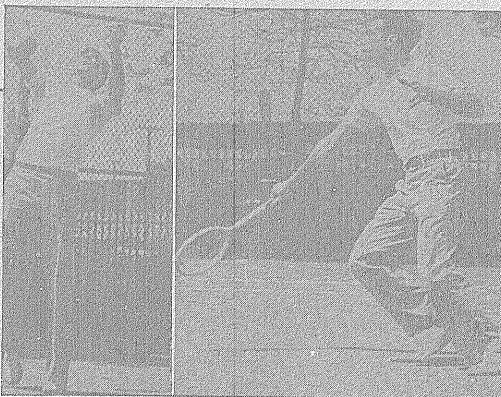
The Techwuk's lone first was scored by K. T. Smith who tossed the shot put 42' 4¼" for individual honors. Chandler Sammons' heave of 41' 7¼" earned third place in this event. The only other individual points were taken by Howie MacAdam who ran fifth in the 220 yard low hurdles.

The Tech entries in both the sprint medley relays and the 880 yard relay finished second. Ralph Vogel, Al Malis, Irving Gelb, and Ed Lindahl teamed in the medley event, and Malis and Gelb joined Howie MacAdam and Ben Sutton to place in the 880 relay.

Other points were picked up by virtue of a third in the mile relay and a fifth place in the distance relay.

The IP golf tournament will be played Saturday, June 8th at the Timber Trails golf course. Each team will consist of four players and will be paired off to play with a pair from another team.

Netmen Lose To Hilltoppers

Illinois Tech's six-meet winning streak and the 1946 varsity tennis season both came to an abrupt end Tuesday as Marquette University rallied to defeat the Techwuks, 5 to 4, at Armour Square.

The Hilltoppers did it the hard way, fighting off two consecutive game sets, and match points in the number two doubles clash to take the decisive match.

Bob Hall, at number one, outplayed Jim Walt, former Wisconsin state doubles champion, to win in straight sets, 6-3, 9-7. Jim Ferguson came from behind to defeat Gene Goeb in the third set, 1-6, 9-7, 6-3, while Captain Gene Hill, playing his last match for Tech, scored in straight sets, 6-3, 7-5.

In the other singles matches, Carl Bergstrom, Bob Davis, and Bill Rubin lost, with Davis dropping a heartbreaker in the third set after gaining a match point at 6-5, 40-30.

Hall and Bergstrom paired in doubles to win 10-8, 6-2, but Marquette won the remaining matches for their seventh victory in eight matches this season.

Of the six regulars who earned eight wins in eleven starts this spring, all but Gene Hill are expected to return next season.

The Techmen rolled over George Williams, Beloit, and Loyola twice and North Central and Concordia once, winning 47 matches.

Company Two Annexes Navy Unit Swim Title

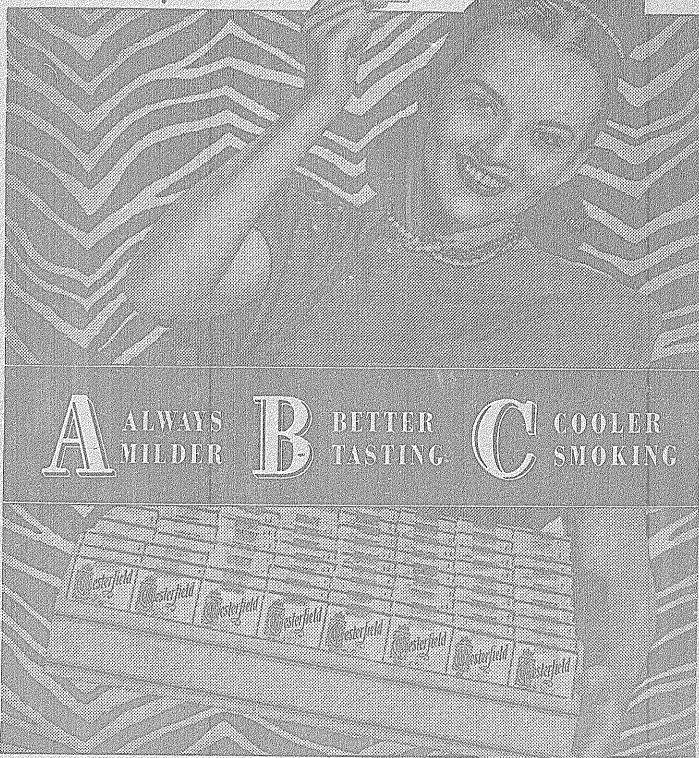

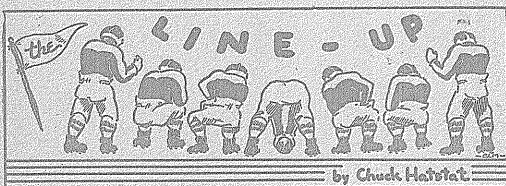

The windup of the spring athletic schedule next week brings the Tech baseball team up against the Indiana State Penitentiary in Michigan City on Saturday. It brings to a close a not too glorious diamond campaign. With a record of two wins in seven starts, the Techmen faced Concordia last Saturday, and the tough State Pen outfit threatens to throw them for another loss this week. Injuries have cut the mound staff to one man, Ken Adams.

Next season's outlook is no brighter, with nearly the entire starting lineup leaving the NROTC unit, and no indication from underclassmen that there will be any first class material available. Bill MacDonough may be out permanently with stretched shoulder ligaments, leaving Danny O'Connell, Jim Scofield and possibly Charlie Swanson as returning lettermen.

Capture of the interfrat trophy by the Pi Kapps was expected to put the third and clinching leg on it. It was supposed to have been a three way race between the Alpha Sigs, Triangle, and the Pi Kapps, but a check of the records shows Triangle to be the only fraternity to take the trophy title. Hence, though the Junior Week win makes the Pi Kapps the only team to take it twice in a row, the trophy has yet to be installed permanently in a chapter house.

The IP finals cost Triangle a fine shortstop in Dick Lund. Injured in a slide at the plate, Lund nevertheless continued to play for six innings until the increasing pain forced him out in the eighth, and examination revealed a broken knee cap, requiring at least four weeks hospitalization.
