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Students to Pick Junior Week Prom Queen

Queen Contest Will Climax Junior Prom Winner to be Decided By Vote of Students Before Junior Week

Junior Week of 1946 will be climaxed by the crowning of Queen of the Junior Prom. The queen and the two members of her court will be chosen by a popular vote of the IIT student body conducted by the *Technology News*.

Candidates will be submitted by Illinois Tech students. The only requirement to be met is that the candidate, if selected to be the queen or her court, must be present at the Junior Prom. The dance will be held on Wednesday night, May 23rd at the Gold Room of the Congress Hotel.

Pictures of candidates may be submitted between today and 5 p.m. Monday, May 20. Photographs may be either head and shoulder views or full length, but must be 5x7, 8x10 inches or larger.

Arrangements have been made to have the photographs handled by the Dean of Students office in the Student Union. Dean Jack White has stated that his office will see that all photographs are returned to the persons submitting them.

The submitted pictures will be displayed in the Student Union and voting will be carried out on Tuesday, May 21 and Wednesday, May 22. The names of the queen and her court will not be announced until just before the coronation.

The Queen of the Junior Prom will be crowned by Dr. Henry T. Heald, president of IIT. He will also present the queen and the two runner-ups comprising her court with

Parking Prohibited On Campus Streets

In order to give students a better view of rolling traffic and also to make crossing less hazardous, the Council for Campus Safety has recommended that parking be prohibited on 33rd Street from State Street to the New York Central tracks and on Federal from 33rd to 34th streets, stated Mr. William Farduhn, superintendent of buildings and grounds.

Accordingly, the City of Chicago has passed an ordinance to this effect and violators will be issued a court summons.

Five parking lots on the campus have been provided and it is recommended that they be used. They are located south of Chapin Hall, south of the Foundry Building, between Machinery Hall and the Automotive Lab, north of the Automotive Lab and south of the Main. The one south of the Main is reserved for faculty only. These parking lots will be flood lighted at night and will be watched by policemen on the campus.

Deadline on Applications For Scholarships is Set

The office of the Dean of Students last week announced that the deadline for the William J. Cook Scholarship applications on renewals of them will be Wednesday, May 15. The deadline for all Institute scholarships will be on Friday, June 7. In connection with this Dean Jack White said, "The Institute will be much more liberal in the granting of scholarships for next term."

Westinghouse and Standard Oil Grant Fellowships to IIT

Three Westinghouse research fellowships, and one Standard Oil fellowship in chemical engineering will be awarded at IIT this year.

The main purposes of the Westinghouse fellowships are: To contribute to the development of the sciences behind modern industry and to make the research men familiar with the scientific problems facing the electrical industry.

The Fellows may choose to do research in such fields as nuclear physics, dielectrics, applied mechanics, ferromagnetism, electricity in gases, and chemical physics. They will devote all their time to research on their own projects at the Westinghouse Research Foundation.

The Fellows, who must have a doctors degree or its equivalent, will receive a salary of \$3300 a year, with a two weeks vacation in addition to leaves to attend scientific meetings and to visit other laboratories.

All applications for the fellowships must be in by April 15, and the appointees will be expected to report by October 1, 1946.

IIT Evening Division Plans for Summer

Dr. Stanton E. Winston, Director of the Evening Division at the Illinois Institute of Technology, said today that registration for the summer session of the Evening Division will be held on June 27-28 from 6 to 9 p.m. Classes will begin on July 1 and continue to August 30.

The schedule for the summer courses has been completed and will be in printed form by May 6. All classes will be held only on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. The courses taught will include mathematics, economics, technical drawing, and language. Physics and chemistry will not be offered due to the limited length of time. During this summer term all sessions will be held at the south campus.

The offices of the Evening Division are now located in U-2E Student Union which was formerly occupied by the Dean of Students.

Forum to Have First Meeting

The Forum Club will present the first of a series of all school assemblies planned for this semester on Friday. Guest speakers will be present to discuss the Spanish political situation and its effect on world events today. The speakers will be Rev. Paul J. Folino, William Sennet, and a third speaker, as yet unannounced.

Rev. Folino will represent the Joint Anti-Fascist league. He is the minister of the United Church of South Chicago, which is a Presbyterian and Congregational church. Rev. Folino has served as chairman of the Chicago Regional Action Committee of the "Protestant" magazine and the Committee for Social Action of the Congregational Christian Conference of Illinois. He has worked with organizations dedicated to fighting anti-Semitism and Fascism.

William Sennet is a member of the Veterans of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade. He served for two and a half years with the Spanish Republican Army, holding the rank of Commissar, which is the equivalent of a Lt. Colonel in the U.S. army. Mr. Sennet is a veteran of the war also, serving in the Orientation Education branch of the U.S. army as an enlisted man. Before the war, he was employed in the Studebaker plant, serving as chairman of the grievance board.

"All students should attend this meeting," said Hubert Helfer, vice-
