

Valparaiso Hands Techawks 10-0 Defeat on IIT Home Field

MacDonough, Adams Hurl; Valpos Collect Thirteen Hits in Nine Inning Blasting

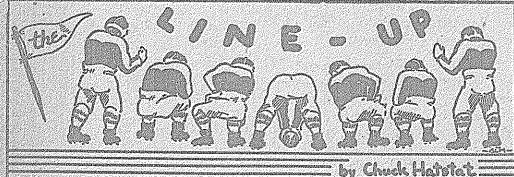
Illinois Tech dropped its third game of the season Saturday when the baseball team lost to the Valpos from Valparaiso College by a lopsided score of 8 to 0. Coach Weissman started MacDonough on the mound and threw Ken Adams in the fifth after the Valpos collected three runs from MacDonough. Neither hurler was able to do much against the sharp hitting Valpos, MacDonough giving up eight hits and Adams allowing five for a total of thirteen base blows. The Techawks garnered eight hits from Schub, the Valpo hurler, who went the route, striking out fifteen men.

The initial stanza was saved personally by southpaw Bill MacDonough after he loaded the sacks by hitting Doering, Valpo centerfielder, and giving up a walk and a single with only one down. He fanned the next two batters to end the threat. In the Techawk half, leadoff man Jim Knowlton was the only hitter, and he died on first when Jim Sullivan and Scofield went down swinging and Captain Fran Krawczak popped up to second.

Big inning for the Techawks was the third. Third man up, Knowlton, was passed, and Sullivan banded out a single. Krawczak, big stick man of the team, walked to load the bases with two outs. Scofield, who seems to have had a bad day at the plate, struck out to all Techawk threats until the last half of the ninth, when the same thing happened again. Jim Raifling, who played a good game at center field, banded out a single. Hank Eype dropped a high one in the left fielder's glove, but Barr, pinch-hitting for Charlie Swanson, singled. Adams grounded to Schub and was thrown out at first. The front end of the batting order was up and it looked as though the Techawks would push across a run. Knowlton walked, loading the sacks, but those three men died on base when Jim Sullivan was fanned, ending the game.

The fastest moving inning was the Valpo half of the eighth when five tallies poured across the plate. Ken Adams faced ten men before he was able to put three of them out. First man up, Koldeway, walked and third baseman Bud clouted a safe single. From there Adams pitched to the entire batting order of the Valpos before Koldeway again came up to strike out, ending the inning. For three hits, the Valpos got five runs, RUNAWAY.
