The Techawk cagers, with a re-vised lineup, lost to Concordia College last Saturday, Feb. 8, by 12 points, 51 to 39. Jim Oldshue was high scoree of the game with 13 points.

Three of the starting five of last semester, Glenn Neiswander, Ray Murphy, and Ned Grable have graduated. However, three more players have been added to the squad to bring the squad back to size; Carl Bergstrom, captain, Charles Futterer, and Warren Sommers.

The Techawks got off to a slow start against Concordia, and were behind 7 to 0 before the first Tech basket was scored. The Techawks then pulled up during the first half. and after being ahead several times, were behind 21 to 19 at the half. Fall Behind in Second Half

In the second half, the Techawks wearied and the Concordia Five pulled into the lead to stay there. The final tally was Concordia 51, Illînois Tech 39.



## 50 Schools to Compete in 31 **Events at Illinois Tech Relays**

One of the nation's largest indoor track and field carnivals, the 1947 Illinois Tech Relay Games, will feature the opening of the spring sports parade for Illinois Tech students and representatives of approximately fifty colleges and universities throughout the midwest.

Scheduled for March 15 at the University of Chicago Fieldhouse, the meet will be revived after a three-year wartime lapse. Thus far the initial response from track coaches has been almost unanimously enthusiastic and indicates one of the finest entry lists in the 15-year history of the meet.

Last held in 1943, the Illinois Tech Relays attracted 12 universities and 24 colleges to win recognition as the largest indoor collegiate meet in the

#### DEFENDING CHAMPIONS TO COMPETE

Notre Dame University, coached by the veteran E. R. "Doc" Handy who led his team to the university championship over Illinois, Michigan, Michigan State and others 1943, will return to defend its title.
