## Dr. Boder to Talk On Displaced People

Dr. David P. Boder, professor of psychology, will address the Human Development Student Organization and the Psychology Club of the Uni-

and the Fsychology clus of the Oniversity of Chicago tomorrow.

The talk, which will begin at 8 p. m. will be on the topic: "Displaced People of Europe—A Preliminary Report on a Psychological Study."

It will be given in the Auditorium for the Chapter Edu-(room 126) of the Graduate Education Building, 5835 Kimbark Ave. There is no admission charge.

Dr. Boder spent last summer in Europe, using the wire recorder to obtain completely accurate data from those he interviewed. He visited displaced person's camps, shelter houses, training centers, and children's colonies in France, Switzer-land, Italy, and the American zone in Germany. He has recorded more than 100 hours of personal histories as told to him by the displaced people in their own way and in their own language. Excerpts from these recordings will be used to illustrate Dr. Boder's talk

## **Probation Policy** Recommended by **IIT Faculty Council**

A restatement of Illinois Tech's probation policy was issued recently. It was recommended by the Faculty Council and has been accepted by the Administrative Council.

The policy, as it now stands, is as

- 1. Students whose cumulative or semester grade averages are below 1.0 will be placed on probation. A student on probation who cannot raise his semester average to 1.0 in one semester or his cumulative average to 1.0 within two semesters will be dismissed immediately.
- 2. Exceptions to the above rule may be made by the dean of students in cases where the shortcoming is due to some justifiable cause, such as ill-
- 3. Students on probation may not participate in any student organization or receive employment or other financial aid from the Institute.
- 4. Dismissed students may be reinstated not sooner than one semester after dismissal. Reinstatement will include examinations.
- 5. Students on probation, may not enroll for less than twelve or more than eighteen semester hours of class work per semester.

Levinson will post his office hours in Sonny Weissman's office and has urged all seniors to attend to their locker registration as soon as possible since there are only 250 available.


