

Marines to Conduct Recruiting Service Here For Two Days

On Wednesday and Thursday, Marine Sgt. M. M. Montonara of the Flying Marine Corps Reserve will conduct an open session to recruit Illinois Tech men for the program.

The organized Marine Corps Reserve is composed of veterans of all branches of service under the age of 32 and men without prior military training who have reached the age of 17. The desire and ability to participate actively in organized military training without disrupting normal civilian pursuits are the principle requirements for eligibility. Marine aviation reservists from the Chicago area attend drill periods at NAS, Glenview, Illinois two days each month plus a 15 day unit training period in the early fall, and for this part time training receive approximately 82 full days pay for the year.

Those Illinois Tech men joining the program during the present recruiting period will be able to serve with VMF-121, the highest scoring squadron in the Marine Corps, whose ranks once included many of the Marine Corps' most famous flyers.

Complete details will be available from Sgt. Montonara in Dean White's office during school hours on these days. Those unable to contact the sergeant at that time can see or call Lt. J. E. Nelson at the Veterans office.

Virgil Gunlock Speaks On Social and Business Problems in Engineering

Sixteen men were pledged to Tau Beta Pi, national engineering honorary, at an all-school honor assembly last Friday. Four outstanding lower classmen were also honored at the assembly and Virgil Gunlock, commissioner of subways and superhighways of the city of Chicago, later addressed the group.

He also related plans for construction of new subways and superhighways to relieve Chicago's traffic congestion, and stressed various problems involved in the field. He stated that planning done in 1904 is still bearing fruit in the development of Chicago's street and boulevard system.
