

Miracle' Ends Run Of Two Nights On Tech Campus

Opening night of "Miracle on 33rd Street," an original musical written on campus, left its audience with a good taste in its mouth.

Dramatech proved that its determination has in no way decreased since "The Male Animal" and that the 18-day postponement of the presentation produced as near-perfect a play as its 1947-48 theatre crowd has seen.

As the curtain opened, two of Armour's graduating seniors vow to send their sons to their own alma mater. Twenty years later, however, complications enter in the form of Audrey Read. In the part of the son's sweetheart, she causes him to desert his engineering education and follow her family on a journey to South America. Many scenes and songs later, the second finale presents a reunion of the two alumni as class registration runs wild.

Friday night brought with it some unfortunate experiences, among which were the mechanical failure of the curtain and an almost ear-shattering crash backstage during the second act.

Taken as a whole, this last and final run of the 1947-48 Dramatech season showed that great things may be expected from this group in the future.

Vincent Heads English Dept.

Howard P. Vincent, professor of English literature, has been named chairman of the department of language, literature, and philosophy, according to John D. Larkin, dean of liberal studies. Professor Vincent has been acting chairman of the department for the past academic year.

He came to IIT in 1942 as assistant professor, accepting the position because he was "impressed with the spirit of progressiveness" displayed at the Institute.

He is a graduate of Oberlin college where he majored in English and studied fine arts and history. He has MA and PhD degrees from Harvard university, where he was awarded a travelling fellowship in 1930. With the aid of this award Professor Vincent toured Europe. He returned to England in 1932 and again in 1937 to continue his studies.

Professor Vincent is general editor of the Collected Writings of Herman Melville and author of The Trying-out of Moby Dick. During the summer he will conduct a special seminar on Herman Melville at the University of Indiana.

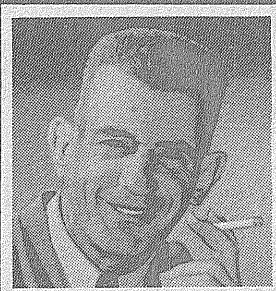
