

Illinois And Michigan Normal Top Relays

Defending Champions In Both Divisions Succeed In Their Title Defense

The seventeenth annual Illinois Tech Relays, world's largest indoor track meet, came to a successful close Saturday night. A crowd of 2,500 saw 250 contestants, representing 60 colleges and universities, vie for top honors on the clay track of the University of Chicago field house.

When the final scores had been tabulated, Illinois, with 53½ points, headed the winner's column in the university division. Michigan was close behind with 52 points, and Notre Dame placed third with 38.

In the college division, Michigan State Normal amassed a total of 55½ points to beat out all other contenders. Baldwin-Wallace placed second with 36 and Wheaton followed with 35.

Dillard Sets Indoor Record

The meeting was highlighted by the individual performance of Harrison Dillard (Baldwin-Wallace) who tied the American indoor record of :08.4 seconds in the college 70 yard high hurdles and established a new indoor record of :07.7 seconds for the 70 yard low hurdles. Lorenzo Wright, Wayne university's "one man gang," set a new Tech Relay and field house record of 24' 5¾" in the college broad jump. Another meet record fell when Loyola's mile relay team covered the distance in 3:23, beating out the previous mark of 3:26.

Porter Ties Dillard Record

Charles Fonville of Michigan, Bill Porter of Northwestern, and Dwight Eddleman of Illinois, were the stars in the university division. Fonville, shot put artist extraordinary, broke the relay and field house record with a toss of 56' 2¾". "Big Charley" was within inches of tying his world record of 56' 10¾". Porter out-distanced all other runners in the university 70 yard high hurdles, tying his own indoor record of :08.5 seconds. In the 70 yard low hurdles the Evanston speed king broke the tape in :07.7 seconds.

Porter's achievement came just five minutes after Dillard had accomplished the same results. Eddleman became the first man in Tech Relay history to win championship honors in the same event for three consecutive years. The Illini star tied his '46 and '47 record of 6' 4" in the university high jump. However, his victory was shared with three other contestants, Jones of Purdue, Dolan of Michigan, and Anderson of Illinois.

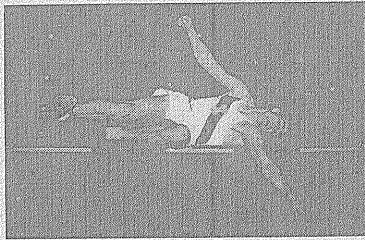
Campbell Leads Michigan Normal

Garon Campbell, co-holder of the meet record of :07.1 seconds, once more flashed to victory in the college 70 yard dash. His :07.2 seconds gave Michigan State Normal their only first place. However, they scored in all events except the 70 yard high hurdles. This victory established them as college champions in the last six out of seven meets. Illinois won their second consecutive championship, but fell way short of the 751½ points they totaled last year.

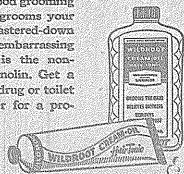

Carlman And Erickson Lead Swimmers; Team Finishes Third In Quadrangular

The Tech swimming team came out third in a four way meet with Loyola university, University of Chicago, and the University of Illinois—Navy Pier. Tech showed well in the preliminaries with men qualifying for the finals in every event except the finals. However, the score tallied Chicago 64, Loyola 32½, Illinois 30½, and Navy Pier 25.

Ray Klitzke took third honors in diving with 74 points, while Tom Haggarty of Loyola won with 77 points. Ted Erickson and Joe Peters placed second and fifth in the 440 yard freestyle event, then went on to take third and fifth respectively in the 220. Leonard Carlman came in second with Ernie Helmer in fifth place, in a very close 200 yard breaststroke race. Ted Amberg took fourth in the 60 yard freestyle and tied for fifth in the 100. Bill Maier came in fifth in the 60. The Tech 400 yard freestyle relay composed of Jack Madsen,

Maier, Kirby Strickland, and Amberg placed second to Chicago. Art Alterman, Helmer, and Madsen swam the 300 yard medley relay finished fourth.

Culver Cadets Foil Techawk Fencers

The fencing team battled for four hours against Culver Military Academy. The contest ended with a score of 20-7 in favor of the cadets.

Melvin Balikow proved his ability to handle a foil by getting a perfect score of 3. No other Techhawk scored against the cadets with this weapon.

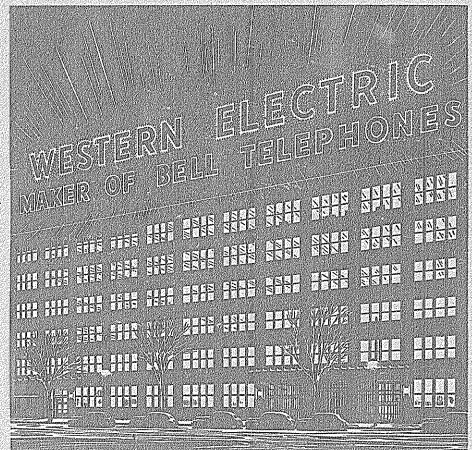
The sabre squad, composed of Ed Konec, John Bergeson and Bill Clark, lost every bout it fought.
