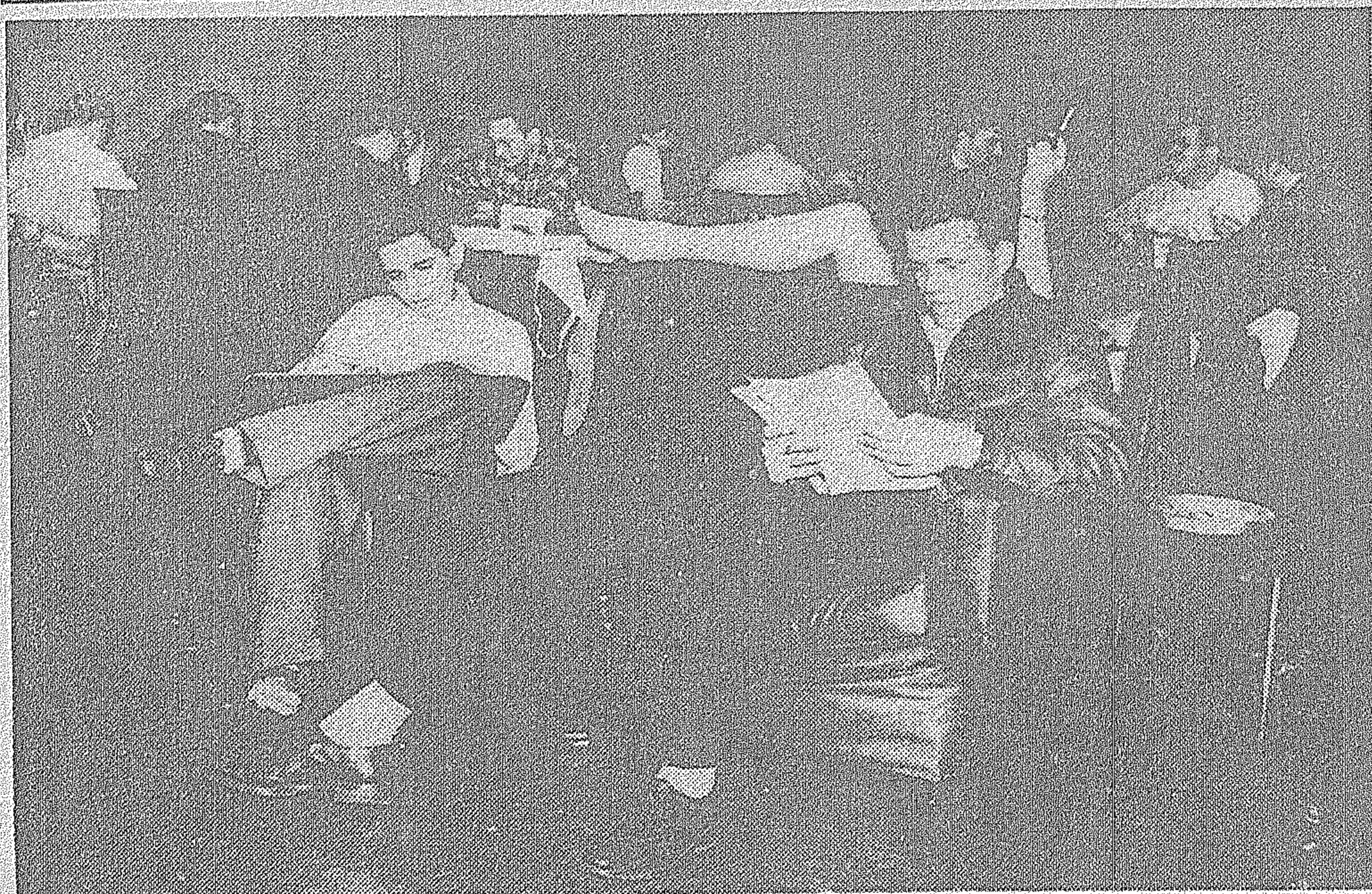




THE PEACEFUL ATMOSPHERE of the South Union lounge makes it possible for students to have a pleasant place to study, lounge and play cards during their free hours.

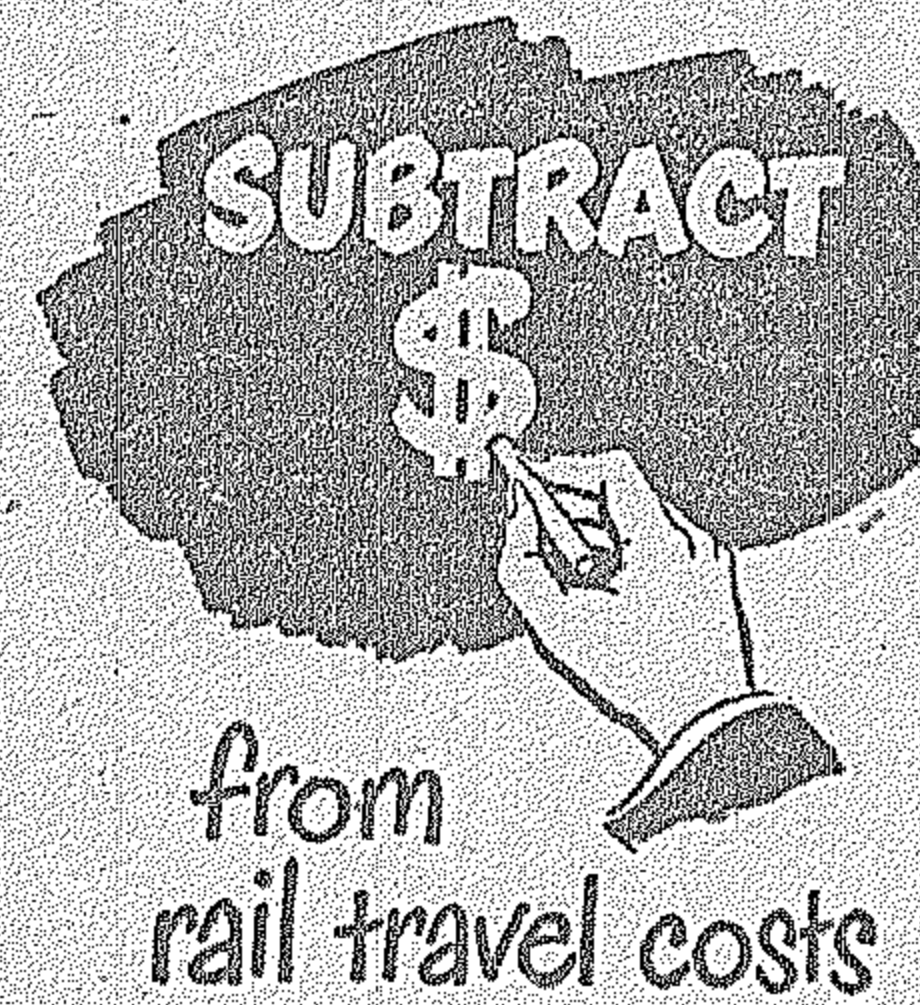
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
