**NEW GRADE SYSTEM**—As a stimulant to scholastic zeal among students at IIT, a new grade point system is to be installed. Based on the highly successful psychology of the pinball machine, the new plan awards one million points for an "A," while "B," "C," and "D" are worth 750,000, 500,000, and 250,000 points, respectively. A mammoth new IBM score calculator is being specially constructed for the purpose. During registration, each student is given a key bearing his code markings. ## New building to facilitate indoor sports

The new structure, to be known as "Gaming Hall," will provide space for a collegiate Monte Carlo, returns from which will finance all instructional activities.
