

# License exams set for May 24

Edwin R. Whitehead, member of the Illinois Professional Engineers Examining Committee, announced this week that the examination of applicants for professional engineer licenses will be held May 24.

Under the rules of the Illinois State Department of Registration and Education, any graduate or student in his last term of an accredited engineering college may apply for the theoretical or "Engineer-in-Training" examination.

Any student in line for graduation in June may apply for the examination to be held on May 24. If 20 or more applications are received from

## AIEE papers win awards

Maier Margolis and Robert Teasdale were judged winners of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers papers contest held April 12. The judging committee declared Kenneth McGlashan and William Firestone to be second in the competition.

Margolis, 8th term EE, took top honors in the undergraduate division with a paper on transient analysis by node equations. Teasdale garnered the graduate award with a talk on phase velocity in wave guides. Both received \$15 cash awards.

McGlashan presented the design of high voltage power supplies for Geiger counters as his laurel winning paper of the undergrad section. McGlashan and Firestone accepted \$10 in prize money.

As winners of the local contest, Margolis and Teasdale will compete in the district contest to be held at the University of Michigan April 29. In the two previous district competitions, Illinois Tech finalists have taken honors.

**Illinois Tech students an examination will be held on campus. All applicants will be notified of the time and place of the examination.**

Application forms may be obtained from the Department of Registration and Education, Division of Professional Engineering, Springfield, Illinois, in Dr. Whitehead's office, 202M, or the placement office.

The application must be accompanied by a certified check, money order or bank draft for \$20.

The application must be accompanied by a statement from the registrar's office certifying that the applicant is in line for graduation in June, 1949.

Applications for the examination on May 24 must be in the office of the Department of Registration and Education on or before May 1, 1949.

With administrative members sitting on the board year after year and the student members changing every semester, the obvious just had to happen.

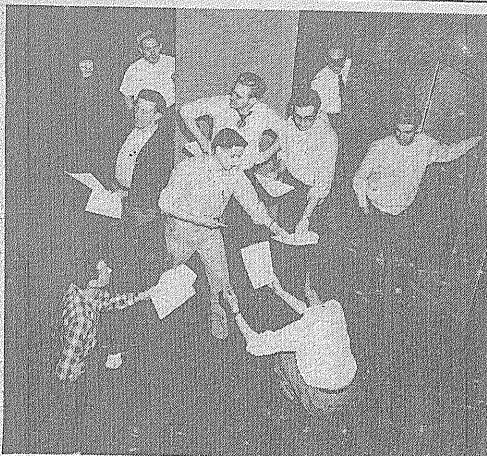

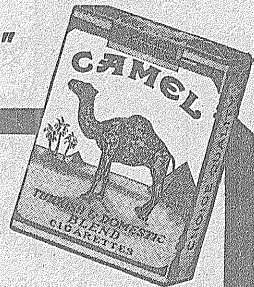
