

Trackmen host DePaul tomorrow

Yahiro and Cox peril old marks

The Techawk track team is eagerly awaiting the appearance of DePaul's Demons tomorrow at 1:30 p.m. on Ogden field. Dropping two "closies" last year to the DePaulites, the thinclads will seek to remain undefeated on their home track and get revenge at the same time. Victors over Navy Pier and Elmhurst by scores of 90-43 and 91-40 respectively, this meet will be more closely contested.

The personal grudge of Captain Jim Sauer will highlight this duel. He tied for third with Demon Jim Lambrecht in the half-mile last Saturday at the Elmhurst Invitational meet. Running in different heats they turned in identical times and the match should show the winner.

Periling long standing Illinois Tech track and field records will be Milt Cox and Ken Yahiro. Milt has jumped within inches of the broad jump record and run the high hurdles in record time and should better this if pressed. Yahiro, sporting a fine built wrapped around a 135-pound frame, whipped the javelin within eight inches of the school record of 169 feet, 9 inches at Elmhurst to place third.

Also placing was the mile relay team of Bob Voightmann, Bill Cahill, Owen Dykema and Sauer, which finished fourth. They won their heat easily, beating DePaul by a good margin, but their time was beaten by three other schools in the next heat. This quartet is also very near the school record and have not been pushed in the two previous home meets.

The shot put and pole vault are just about conceded to the Demons and the Trackhaws must make up the points in the running events.

Bill Baumgartner, Steve Grabowski and Ray Klitzki will hold down the 100 and 220 yd. dashes. Cox, Keith, Wingate, and Dave Miller are high and low hurdles entries. In the quarter mile are Dykema, Voightmann and Cahill, while Cahill and Dykema team up with Sauer in the half mile.

Al Ashurst will see his first real competition in Jack Hurley, slim speedster from DePaul, in the mile and two-mile runs. "Ash" will be supported in the mile by Ted Randich and Dick Durand and in the two-mile by Wally Kohler and Don Anderson.

Cox and Yahiro are the broad jumpers and Wally Conniff shares the high jump with Cox. Yahiro and John Gautier throw the javelin, shot, and discus.

Techawks' bats swung loud and long Tuesday as IIT blasted out 15 hits to dump George Williams, 8-5. Sophomore southpaw Bob Zevitz pitched a brilliant game for Glancy's nine, yielding only four hits and fanning 10 batters.

Tech pushed over two markers in their half of the fourth on singles by Matman, De Lazero and Joe Bass. The Techawks went into a 4-3 lead in the fifth when they scored twice on hits by "Vinny" Haughey, Granert, and Bert Hoffman.

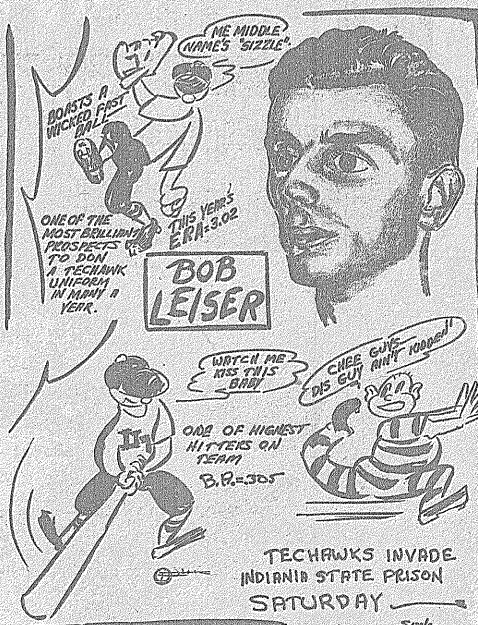

The Techawks went back into the lead to stay in the seventh frame when they scored three times on an error, a base on balls, De Lazero's third straight hit, and a pinch hit single by Don Ross. Tech picked up another run in the eighth inning on three safeties by Haughey, Granert, and Hoffman to give IIT an 8-4 advantage. George Williams scored their last run in the ninth by collecting two of their four hits to make the final score IIT will face Concordia at Armour Square at 1 p.m. Thursday.
