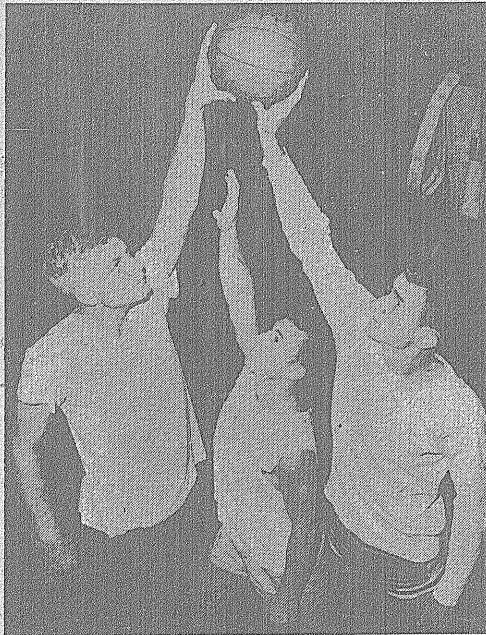


# Sport films highlight Smoker

## Pi Kaps tie Delts, 14-14

The hardest fought game of the IP football tournament was played last Tuesday as the Pi Kappa Phi house came from behind in the waning minutes of the game to tie the Delta Tau Delta, 14-14. The break occurred when Don Frank recovered a fumble in the Delt end zone for the touchdown. Previously, Bob Ross had passed to Art Dammkoehler for the Pi Kap's first score.

The Delt points were scored by "Happy" Howell, who caught passes from Lee Richards and Milt "some jerk picked up off the street" Cox. This was the first game of the second round of the double elimination tourney.

In the first round, Sigma Phi Epsilon defeated Alpha Epsilon Pi by the score of 13-0. Triangle won 18-0 from Tau Epsilon Phi, as two Lee Jacobsen passes to Ken Turner and a run by Ken Koch turned the trick.

## Baylor, TCU game whips football crystal gazers
