preparing them to perform specific tasks in war industry or government services in precedent-shattering time. Thirteen hundred engineers were graduated during the war years, and hundreds of Naval officers were trained on the campus. It conducted an Army Specialized Training Program and a Signal Corps educational program. A Naval R.O.T.C. has since become a permanent part of its educational structure.

FAR-REACHING SECRET WAR RESEARCH Secret war research carried on at the Institute for the Armed Services constituted a potent factor in the over-all prosecution of the war. Illinois Tech also rendered an outstanding service to industry in solving the difficult problems of management and production involved in supplying and equipping the nation's fighting force when time meant lives.

ALWAYS A
"WORK"
ATMOSPHERE

The Institute has always had a "work" atmosphere. No student ever enrolled because he could loaf his way through. High entrance requirements, psychological tests, personal counseling, and Illinois Tech's philosophy of limiting the size of its enrollment to an optimum point for maximum benefit to the student permit only the best qualified applicants to be enrolled. The student body is composed of individuals whose intellectual capacities are in keeping with the rigors of higher education's academic discipline. Men and women who have attended the college came only because they were impelled by their own courage and determination to train themselves for professions of credit to themselves and the community.

In its half-century history of higher education, the Institute has never deviated from its unselfish founding creed of universal service to all.
