ciation. C. Herrick Hammond, an Armour student, is vice-president of the W. I. T. A. The school stands high among Tennis players, and last year's tournament was the most successful in the school's history.

It was under the management of Melville S. Flinn, and its conduct generally has encouraged the belief that the tournament this year can be made an event creditable to the institution and to the association. Prizes to the value of \$80.00 were provided last year, and the management this year should be able to do as well. The Trophy is a beautiful silver cup, presented by Roy K. Hitchens, and it goes to the man who wins two tournaments. It is held at present by C. Herrick Hammond, winner of last year's tournament.

Armour should have tennis courts of its own, in view of the large and increasing interest in the game. The expense of maintaining them would be small. In the light of the encouragement which has been given by Chicago merchants in the way of prizes, and the high position which Armour occupies among tennis players, every effort to promote the interests of the game should meet with a hearty response from the students.
