is given the young men to express themselves, and to ask questions, and to exercise every ability in properly conducting a meeting of this sort. In this connection it is proper to state that at Armour, each meeting is placed in charge of a different person, so that the good which may come from experiences of this sort may be distributed. Not the least of an engineer's requirements is the ability to handle himself. As a preliminary practice, the handling of small assemblies of this character is most excellent. Any student member of the A. I. E. E. is a most welcome visitor to any of its regular meetings. By attending these, he comes in touch with prominent men in his work, and has an opportunity to make acquaintances that will be both pleasant and useful. He will be able to get an idea of standards of excellence—what is to be expected of one who makes a success in his chosen line—and thus shape with more definiteness his aims and ambitions.

The American Institute of Electrical Engineers is an organization that stands at the head of the list of organizations associated with the electrical industry in this country. It represents opportunities that few can afford to disregard. The Student Branch especially commends itself to the Electrical Engineering student because it renders possible a life of endeavor that is of the highest importance and at the same time is within his reach.

The work of the Branch at Armour is growing in extent and importance. It enjoys the distinction of being able to draw inspiration from one of the strongest local branches in the country—the Chicago branch of the A. I. E. E. In the midst of such surroundings, there is every reason to predict bright days ahead for the Armour branch.
