The retiring business manager, in his senior year, is retained as an advisory business manager, but has no delegated coercive powers in the management.

As time goes on, further changes will be necessitated in the management of the publications. When such changes are required, Sphinx will present new workable plans, because Sphinx is composed of those who have indicated their individual abilities by their distinguished association with the publications.
