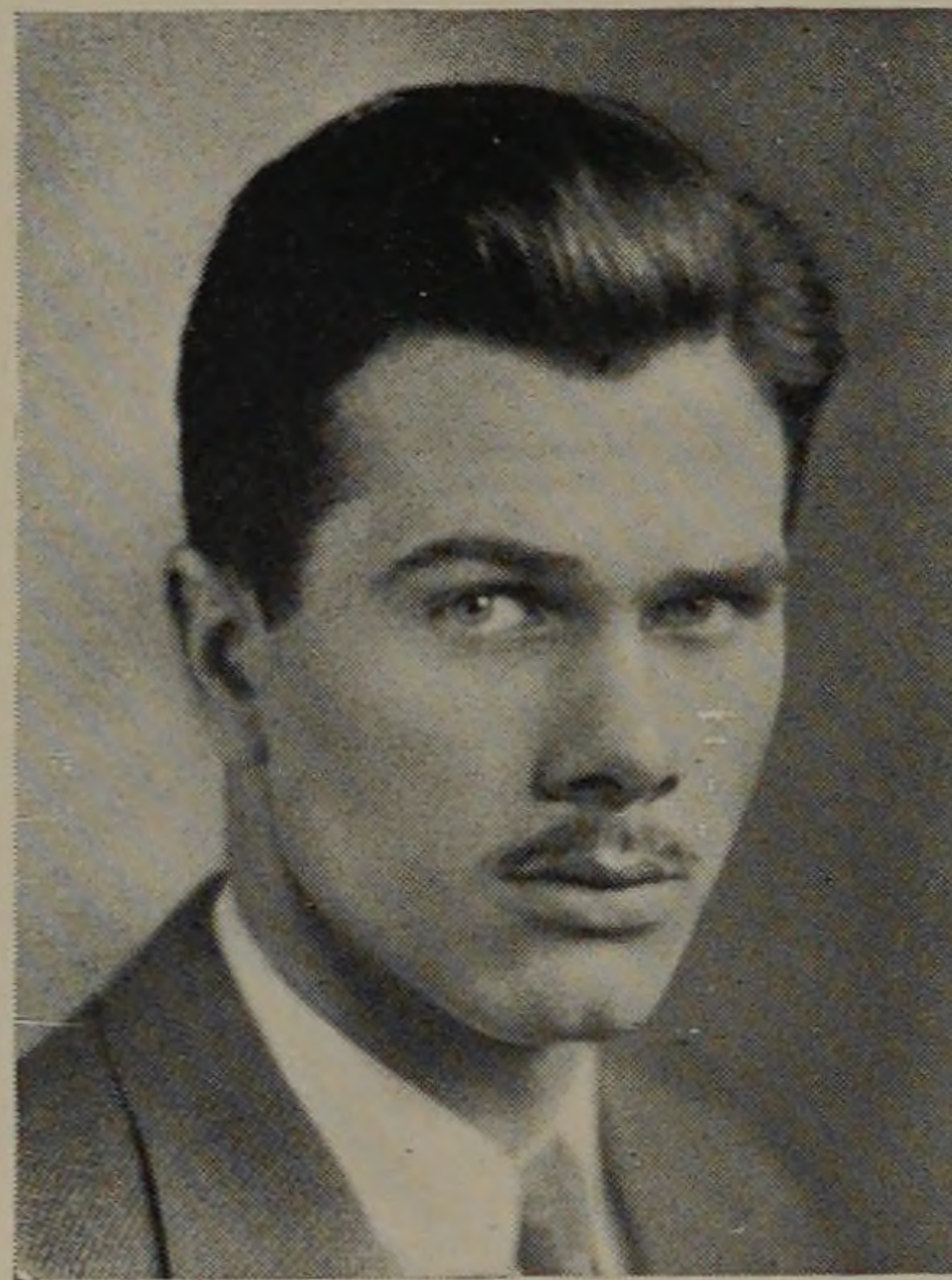


ARMOUR ARCHITECTURAL SOCIETY

Although unlike other societies at Armour Institute, and following a path of its own design, the Armour Architectural Society has succeeded in keeping on its roll those school members who wander about on two campuses.
