Pi Tau Sigma, national honorary mechanical engineering fraternity, was founded March 16, 1915, at the University of Illinois. Its establishment came about when the students in mechanical engineering who had maintained a high grade of scholarship felt the need of an organization to foster the spirit of a liberal culture in engineering students. Its purpose is three-fold: to emphasize through its membership the high ideals of the mechanical engineering profession, to stimulate student interest in coordinate departmental activities in the universities and to promote the welfare of its members.

Delta chapter was the fifth chapter in the fraternity, being chartered December 22, 1924. The fraternity has expanded rapidly and now has nine active chapters on the roll.
