In school during only one-half of a five year period, they spend the remaining time gaining engineering experience by working in industry. A new and radical departure from standard college training this may seem, yet it is not so much as one might believe: The co-operative system of education was first introduced in 1906 at the University of Cincinnati from whence, by 1930, it had spread to nineteen engineering colleges.
