
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The first honorary engineering fraternity to be founded at Armour was Salamander, the honor society for fire protection engineering students. It is the only chapter of the fraternity, since Armour is in the unique position of being the only educational institution in the country offering courses in this specialized field. Steps toward organization were begun in 1922, and in 1923 the society was officially recognized on the Armour campus as the honorary fraternity for the fire protection engineering department. Its members fall into three groups. The largest includes those men who were elected in their undergraduate years. Honor students graduating prior to 1923 in the department have been honored by initiation into the fraternity by the present chapter. A third group includes those men who are graduates of schools other than Armour, but whose activities and contributions toward fire protection have warranted the recognition of their affiliation with the society. The fraternity publishes each spring the Deflector, a news letter filled with information regarding the undergraduate chapter and the activities of the alumni. The paper functions as a means for bringing the chapter and the Institute into closer union with the alumni members.
