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



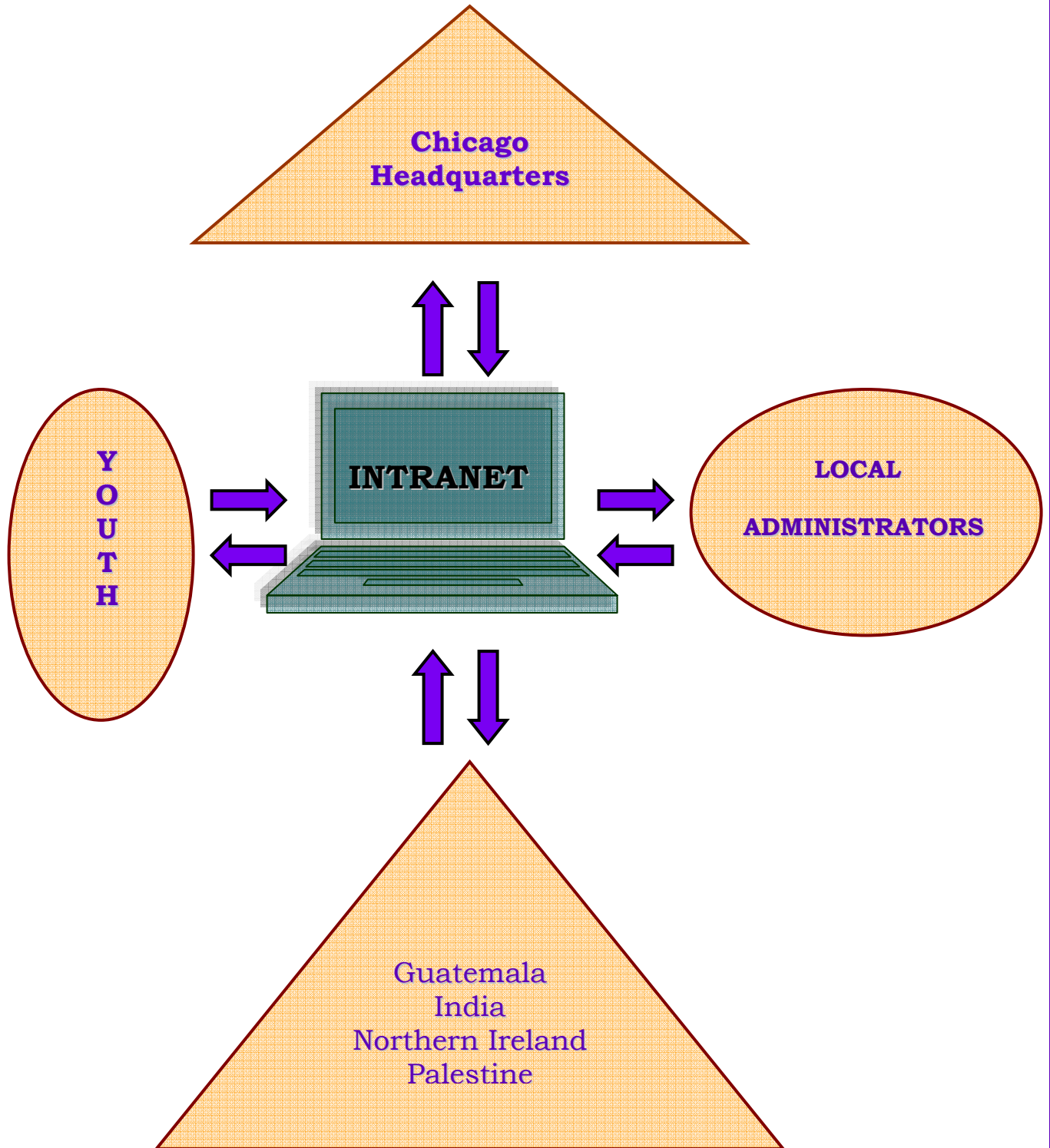

How to set up and view events

To View the Calendar Items

- 1. In the menu of the screen(bottom left) after you have logged in, a small calendar image is available.
- 2. By hovering your mouse over specific dates, a pop up will tell you if there is an event located on that day. By clicking on a specific day, the main window will be replaced with events of the selected day.
- 3. At that point, you may choose to change the view of your calendar to monthly, daily, or weekly.
- 4. Alternatively, you may search for a type of event using the search button.

To Add Events to the Calendar

- 1. In the case that you want to add your own event, you may select the post new event link located in the Event Calendar on the User menu or from the calendar's main page as directed earlier.
- 2. In the window that pops up, a user may enter the information about their event. Here are some notes on adding events.
 - a. If an event is categorized as an official play for peace event, it must be approved by a Play For Peace Administrator.
 - b. If you would like to be contacted about the event that you have set up, leave your contact info in the contact details. For example, leave your username so someone can message you about the event. Otherwise, the event will be anonymous.
- 3. Click on the add Event icon
